Creating a culture of sepsis awareness through advocacy, health literacy, and knowledge translation.

Sepsis is a medical complication of the body's response to fighting an infection. Sepsis can very quickly lead to organ damage and death if not recognized and treated early. Globally public awareness of sepsis is generally low, but we do not know what people living in Canada know about sepsis. This 5-year study aims to assess sepsis awareness and knowledge in Canada, identify major knowledge gaps, and address these gaps with the end-goal to improve sepsis literacy. We will use mixed methods involving national surveys, focus groups, and the development a national campaign to engage, educate, and empower the public to be able to make informed decisions about their health.

Focus Groups

Exploring the lived experiences and perspectives on raising public awareness of sepsis in Canada: A focus group study of adult sepsis survivors and family members of sepsis patients.

Summary: Building on the results of our 2021 <u>survey of public</u> <u>knowledge of sepsis</u>, we conducted focus groups in the Fall of 2022 to better understand factors that may be contributing to gaps in awareness and knowledge. We had 2 main research objectives:

- 1. to explore lived experiences with sepsis, specifically focusing on communications between patients, family, and healthcare providers, and
- 2. to explore what individuals with lived experience of sepsis think the public needs to know about sepsis and how information could be optimally delivered.

We are currently writing up the results.





Results to Date



National Survey

Public awareness and knowledge of sepsis: a crosssectional survey of adults in Canada

Summary: Sepsis can quickly cause life-altering physical and psychological effects and 39% of adults in Canada sampled in our survey have not heard of it. Critically, only a minority knew the possible signs of sepsis, risk factors, and strategies to lower risk. Females, older adults, and adults with post-secondary education were more likely to be aware of sepsis. Education initiatives should focus messaging on infection prevention, employ broad media strategies, and use primary healthcare providers to disseminate evidence-based information
