## 2025 DDH Grad Dinner Valedictorian Speech Tarik Abdulkarim



I'm very happy to see everyone here this evening. An evening where we celebrate our success and hard work with our loved ones.

I'd like to first thank our sponsors for joining here today, Alysson and Lucy, thank you for being here and for your continuous and generous support. Our beloved instructors, Dr. Rock, my fellow classmates, and their guests, I would like to welcome you all and I hope you have an amazing evening.
