- Insights and outcomes from our ongoing grant-funded research activities.



## **Book Release: Seized by Uncertainty**



### About the Book

<u>Seized by Uncertainty: The Markets, Media, and Special</u> <u>Interests that Shaped Canada's Response to COVID-19</u> examines how Canadian governments at various levels responded to the pandemic.

Co-authored by MacEachen Institute Scholarly Director Kevin Quigley and Institute research assistants Kaitlynne Lowe, Sarah Moore and Brianna Wolfe, the book is the result of research conducted in real time, beginning in March of 2020 as COVID-19 shut down public life in Canada and abroad.

*Seized by Uncertainty* was published by McGill-Queen's University Press in November 2024.

## Winter 2024: Allan MacEachen Memoirs Course

Through the generosity of Mr. MacEachen's estate, the Institute was given a unique opportunity to use Mr. MacEachen's unpublished memoirs to develop an MPA course. Perspectives on the Contributions of Allan J. MacEachen served as an opportunity to examine his many lasting contributions to public life in Canada through social and economic policy initiatives. For the Fall 2024 semester, the MacEachen Institute hosted Risks and Crises, a Master of Public Administration course co-taught by Kevin Quigley and Darrell Dexter. The course brought together experts and officials from various sectors and all orders of government to

Since 2020, the MacEachen Institute has been conducting SSHRC-funded research focused on improving the accessibility of tourism for people with disabilities. ## Accessibility Standards Canada: Evacuating People with Disabilities

In 2021, the MacEachen Institute received funding from Accessibility Standards Canada to study Evacuating Persons with Disabilities. The project analyzes four stages of evacuation - **communication and alert**; **transportation**; **shelter**; and **return to community -** with a focus on improvements for people with disabilities.

This work was completed in May 2024 with publication of the final report, Mass Evacuation and People With Disabilities, as well as briefing notes, presentations, and reports for each stage of evacuation. <u>Read all the reports here.</u>

# CART Network Partnership with DalTRAC

The MacEachen Institute is a partner in the <u>Dalhousie Transportation Collaboratory's Climate</u> <u>Action Research for Transportation (CART) Network</u>. This \$3.6 million project, funded by Canada's Climate Action and Awareness Fund, is a national endeavour led by **Dr. Ahsan Habib** and DalTRAC in partnership with 3 academic and 14 organizational partners.

The event included a keynote speaker, former Mayor of Toronto David Miller, as well as a panel of local experts in the transportation and planning sectors. Opening remarks were provided by the Honourable Timothy Halman, Minister of Environment and Climate Change for the Province of Nova Scotia.

The MacEachen Institute is a partner in the \$1.6 million project, "<u>A Multi-disciplinary Approach to</u> <u>Research, Education, and Training in</u> <u>Cybersecurity for Emerging Technologies</u>", led by **Dr. Srinivas Sampalli** (Faculty of Computer Science). The project, funded by NSERC and industry partners, will train 200 students in new cybersecurity technologies, developing the workforce Canada needs to address emerging global cybersecurity threats. The MacEachen Institute will support training in cybersecurity policy and governance.

## Mass Evacuation Webinars with York University & Queen's University



In June and July, the MacEachen Institute partnered with emergency management research hubs CIFAL York and Y-EMERGE at York University, and the Institute of Intergovernmental Relations at Queen's University, to host two webinars focused on different aspects of mass evacuation. The webinars, Mass Evacuation & First Nations and Chain Reaction: The Role of Transportation and Humanitarian Supply Chains in Mass Evacuation Planning, attracted over 300 attendees.
