
The Rising Risk for Women

HIV infection through heterosexual transmission is increasing for Canadian women.

- Over 56,000 people in Canada are living with HIV/AIDS.
- 25% of new infections in Canada are in women.
- Women represent an increasing number and percentage of Canadians who are HIV positive.
- Aboriginal, Black, and White women are at higher risk than their male counterparts.
- Aboriginal peoples are infected, on average, with HIV at a younger age than non-Aboriginal peoples.
- 4.4% of Canadians are Aboriginal;
 14.4 % of infected Canadians are Aboriginal.
- 2.1% of Canadians are Black; 20.7% of infected Canadians are Black.

MYTH BUSTERS Facts on HIV/AIDS in Canada

So you've heard	In fact
"AIDS is a gay man's disease."	HIV infection is on the rise for heterosexual women; 25% of new infections are in women between 15 and 49 years old.
"AIDS is less of a problem in Canada now."	In the last ten years, HIV infection in Canadians has almost doubled.
"All Canadians are at the same risk."	Women are at a higher risk of infection due to gender inequalities, particularly women from Aboriginal and Black communities.

HIV/AIDS is on the rise for heterosexual teens.

A national study showed that approximately 50 to 60% of grade 9 and 11 students think there is a vaccine available to prevent HIV/AIDS. The same survey found that 36% of grade 11 students think that there is a cure for HIV/AIDS. (Health Canada)


Voices from the youth of Canada today...
