Course Selection Guide for Undergraduate Planning 2022 – 2023

This guide is for the use of current students in undergraduate planning (BCD) programs. Please refer to the current Academic Calendar for University Regulations and official requirements.

About our programs

Bachelor of Community Design (BCD) Honours, four-year programs


The Planning Profession in Canada recognizes the BCD Honours Majors as professional degrees. Graduates are eligible to become Provisional Members and begin to log credits towards full membership after two years of responsible practice. Honours students are encouraged to join the Professional Body as student members.

BCD Double Major with Sustainability, four year program

Students declare the double major after they have completed their first-year courses BCD by accessing the tool under Web for Students in the Student Records area of Dal Online. Please consult with the College of Sustainability for information about SUST courses and requirements. Double major students have the option of taking the BCD Honours program as long as they fulfill the Honours program admission requirements.

BCD non-accredited, three-year program

This program introduces students to the academic study of planning. Please note that a three-year degree is not usually sufficient background for graduate study. Furthermore, this general 3-year degree is not recognized by the planning profession.



Undergraduate Advisor

The School of Planning has an Undergraduate Advisor to offer advice and assistance to students in the program. If you run into any difficulties, contact the advisor: Kate Thompson (kate.thompson@dal.ca).

Degree Audit Reporting System (DARS)

All students should be familiar with DARS, available on Dal Online. DARS gives you and the University a summary of where you stand in meeting your degree requirements. If you believe there is an error in your DARS report, you should report it to DegreeAudit@dal.ca, or contact the Undergraduate Advisor.

First year course selection

In first year you should take 1000 level, or first year, courses. Then in later years you should take higher-level courses. Check for pre-requisites before registering for higher-level courses. You may not count more than 48 credit hours of 1000 level courses towards your degree in any of the undergraduate programs within the School of Planning.

Note: Where courses are listed, the ".03" after the course number means that the course is worth 3 credit hours. A ".06" means that the course is worth 6 credit hours. Don't forget to sign up for a tutorial or lab section for classes that require it.

Mandatory Courses

In first year you must take the following courses:

PLAN 1001.03 Introduction to Planning (fall)

PLAN 1002.03 Introduction to Community Design (winter)

PLAN 1101.03 Dynamics of Human Settlements (fall)

GEOG/ERTH 1030.03 Physical Geography (offered all semesters)

You also need to take at least 6 credit hours in any combination from among the following:

- SUST 1000.06 What is Sustainability? (offered as a double course in the fall)
- PLAN 1201.03 Environmental Systems in Planning (winter)
- ARCH 1001.03 Introduction to Architecture 1 (fall)
- ENVS 1100.03 Foundations of Environmental Science (fall)
- ENVS 1200.03 Environmental Challenges (winter)

You may take more than 6 credit hours of these courses. Extra courses will count towards your core electives. If you are considering the double major with Sustainability, then you should take SUST 1000.06 in the fall, and SUST 1001.06 in the winter of your first year.

Course selection for transfer students

Students with previous university or community college credits may transfer to the Planning program with advanced standing. Acceptance into the program is not automatic. A minimum grade point average of 2.2 or C is the minimum required for transfer to the program. Higher standards apply when spaces are limited. The Registrar determines which courses may transfer for credit. Minimum grade standards are required to transfer specific courses. You must complete at least 50% of your degree credits at Dalhousie to earn a Dalhousie degree. Students from any university background may apply to transfer. For admission, you need to meet the same course requirements as direct from high school applicants. Those with relevant courses

may be able to transfer specific requirements (such as core electives) from previous study.

Students should take PLAN 1001.03, PLAN 1002.03, PLAN 1101.03, and ERTH 1030.03 (unless they have been granted transfer credit for previous course work that fulfils the requirement).

Transfer students with appropriate educational background may receive permission to take second year courses simultaneously with first year courses, if space is available. Contact the Undergraduate Advisor (kate.thompson@dal.ca) for further information regarding your application for this expedited first year, or to discuss any transfer credits that may apply.

Additional requirements for all BCD students

Courses included in the lists below may change. Not all courses are offered every semester, or every year. Students must meet program or prerequisite requirements to register in courses.

Note that SUST 1000.06 satisfies the entire BCD writing requirement. Any SUST course can be used toward satisfying either the science requirement or the arts, humanities and social sciences requirement. One of our required courses, ERTH/GEOG 1030.03, is used toward satisfying the science requirement.

BCD Core Electives

Students are required to take core electives, which are PLAN courses (other than required courses) and other Dalhousie courses that support the planning curriculum. Several PLAN core electives are recommended in the program plans on pages 6-8; the full list of core electives is available in the Undergraduate Calendar under Community Design:

Choose no more than two core electives at the 1000 level. <u>See the notes at the bottom of the program plans</u> for the minimum number of core electives you require for your program. If you take more than the required minimum number of core electives, the extra courses will be counted as free electives.

BCD Writing Requirement

You need to take 6 credit hours of courses that meet the writing requirement of the BCD program in your first year. Note that not all courses listed in the Dal Calendar as "university writing requirement" are on this list.

Science, and Arts, Humanities or Social Sciences Requirements for BCD Within your BCD program, you need at least 6 credit hours in a science and 6 credit hours in arts, humanities or social sciences courses. If you can't satisfy these in the first year, you may do so later.

BCD Honours

The BCD Honours programs provide opportunities for students who excel in their studies in the first three years of university studies in Community Design to deepen their understanding and specialize through additional course work, an internship (a volunteer, part-time work placement), and community-based research projects. Students have a choice of major within the Honours program: Urban Design and Planning, or Environmental Planning. Please see the program plans at the end of this document for course offerings for the honours year.

Professional recognition: The Planning Profession in Canada recognizes the BCD Honours Majors as first professional degrees. Graduates are eligible to become Provisional Members and begin to log credits towards full membership after two years of responsible practice. BCD students are encouraged to join the Professional Body as student members during their studies.

Entry to honours is competitive. Students apply for honours in the winter semester of their third year. Admission to the Honours degree requires the following:

- 3.0 or higher cumulative GPA; and
- 3.0 or higher GPA calculated for mandatory planning and core elective courses completed at the time of application to the Honours program; and
- Submission of a portfolio. Requirements of the portfolio are available from the School of Planning.

Once in the Honours program, students must maintain both a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher and a GPA of 3.0 or higher for mandatory Planning courses and core electives.

Please contact the School of Planning for more detailed information on the honours application process, including application submission requirements, deadlines, timelines and information on how your application will be evaluated.

Each November, the School presents an information session for BCD students who are interested in honours.

Program Options

Minors

Any approved minor within Dalhousie's College of Arts and Science is available to students in four-year (120 credit hour) BCD degree programs (i.e., all BCD Honours degrees and the BCD Double Major with Sustainability degree). How to declare a minor:

- Students in the BCD Double Major with Sustainability can declare their minor using the online form under Web for Students in the Student Records area of Dal Online
- Single Major Honours students must declare their minor on their honours application form.

Certificates

A Certificate can be completed by a student in an undergraduate program, in addition to the student's regular program requirements. Completion of such a Certificate would be noted at convocation, and shown on the student's transcript. From among the certificates that Dal offers, the following may be of particular interest to planning students.

Certificate in Geographic Information Science

It is recommended that students enrol in the GIS Certificate in their second or third year of studies, and that they contact the Certificate Coordinator at that time. To enrol, students must declare the Certificate through Dal Online. To qualify for the Certificate, students must complete all course requirements, and have received approval for the research component (project) from the Certificate Coordinator prior to the start of the research course. Certificate in Environment, Sustainability and Society (ESS)

The ESS Certificate is open to current undergraduate students from any Faculty at Dalhousie, excluding those who have declared ESS as a Major or Minor subject. You will explore many current sustainability issues and can focus on specific areas of interest. Topics of study include food, energy, resources, climate change, governance, and conflict resolution.
