Using Song in Language Revitalisation

Heather Sparling is Canada Research Chair in Musical Traditions as well as Associate Professor of Ethnomusicology at Cape Breton University. Her research has focused on Gaelic song and Gaelic song culture in Nova Scotia. Most recently, she is the author of *Reeling Roosters and Dancing Ducks:* Celtic Mouth Music (Cape Breton University Press, 2014). Currently, she is assessing how music sustains communities, whether at a moment of sudden crisis, such as a mining disaster, or over a long-term challenge, such as the decline of Gaelic speakers in Nova Scotia. She is particularly interested in song-writing as a means to building and sustaining community.
