


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Dean's Message

I am delighted to report that our undergraduate medical education program has received accreditation for an eight-year term. This favourable result is the culmination of years of effort throughout the Faculty of Medicine, during which we examined every aspect of our curriculum and operations and took the necessary actions to ensure everything we do meets the extremely high bar set by the accrediting bodies.

Of the 12 overall standards, 11 were rated as satisfactory and one as satisfactory with further monitoring in a year when we have more data in hand. We will follow up with Committee on Accreditation of Canadian Medical Schools (CACMS) about progress made regarding this standard in a report to our accreditors required in one year.

The accreditation review team reported they were particularly impressed by the high degree of engagement of our leaders, faculty, students and staff in improving the quality of medical education. Other notable strengths are the quality of our IT technical and human resources. The accreditors also praised the quality of our distributed education programs and Dalhousie Medicine New Brunswick. Representatives conducted their site visit to Dalhousie Medical School's facilities in Halifax and Saint John between February 26 and March 1, 2017.

In addition to accreditation, it has been another very productive year for the Faculty of Medicine and Dalhousie Medicine New Brunswick (DMNB).

The Fredericton clinical site prepared itself for its launch as a Longitudinal Integrated Clerkship Dalhousie (LICD) site in the fall 2017. This was done through administrative and faculty meetings, and faculty development sessions.

DMNB students continued to impact their local communities with their service learning projects. This is an optional credited course students can take in their first two years of study. During the course they work with community organizations to help create deliverables that positively impact the marginalized and underserved populations the organizations support. You can read more about their impact in this report where one of the projects is highlighted.

In research, Dr. Anthony Reiman, DMNB's assistant dean of research was awarded the Terry Fox Foundation's \$5million grant. Although he received the funding through his position as the Canadian Cancer Society Research Chair at the University of New Brunswick, the NB portion of research will be conducted in the lab at DMNB, highlighting the level of collaboration and synergy between our two historic institutions.

Congratulations to all students, staff and faculty at DMNB for another outstanding year!

As we continue to move forward and help the Faculty of Medicine implement our strategic plan, #DalMedForward, we also pause intermittently to celebrate our successes.

This year, 2017 marks the graduation of Dalhousie Medicine New Brunswick's fourth cohort of medical students. We are proud of their accomplishments and look forward to their continued success.

This graduating cohort was our first class to participate in the Research In Medicine program. This program has seen numerous students publish in peer-reviewed journals and present at regional, national and international conferences. The engagement of New Brunswick faculty and members from the University of New Brunswick in this program is testament to the strong working relationships that our co-location has fostered and continues to strengthen.

We are now at the point in our brief history where we have graduates who have completed family medicine residency and are establishing practices in New Brunswick. Our LOCATED project has tracked six of our graduates who have finished residency. Of these, five have chosen to establish themselves in New Brunswick and one in Nova Scotia.

Our researchers continue to perform and attract national level funding to help improve the health of citizens in our Province. Funding has been successfully obtained from national organizations like the Heart and Stroke Foundation of Canada and Canadian Diabetes

Association.


Of course our program would not be possible without the continued support of our New Brunswick faculty and volunteers.


Admissions

Clinical Education Update

The 2016-17 year at DMNB has been one in which we continued to consolidate clinical activities across all sites, all the while continuing to expand and innovate.

As simulation activities for medical students continue to evolve, we were excited to purchase medium-to-high fidelity mannequins for all five of our clinical teaching sites and provide training for faculty at our distributed sites; simulation sessions are now being delivered in all sites, ensuring that students are fulfilling mandatory curricular requirements across the province.

One of the major activities at DMNB last year was preparing for and completing the CACMS/LCME Accreditation visit. Innumerable hours were spent getting ready for this process, as it was the first time that Dalhousie Medicine had been accredited since the addition of our satellite campus at DMNB.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of the clinical leaders and staff who helped us achieve a successful eight year accreditation! The commitment of the entire team at DMNB was certainly a strong contributing factor in our success!

The LICD (Longitudinal Integrated Clerkship Dalhousie) continues to expand in the province; this fall, the Fredericton site implemented its LICD, bringing the total number of LICD clerkship positions in NB to 16 across four sites! The Saint John site continues, in its proud

tradition, to offer excellent traditional core block rotations in clerkship for the other 14 clerkship positions. DMNB is now acting as a resource for LICD program expansion in Nova Scotia; Cape Breton will be hosting their first four LICD students in two sites in 2019.

As we continue to mature as a satellite program, new positions have been added incrementally to ensure that we are delivering a comparable curriculum.

Dr. Marc Nicholson is the new Director of Interpofessional Education, an area which has seen rapid growth in our undergraduate curriculum. Also, Dr. Ross Morton is our new Clinical Skills Director; I would like to thank Dr. Chris Vaillancourt, who was the inaugural Clinical Skills Director at DMNB and who certainly created a very strong foundation upon which Dr. Morton can build.

DMNB continues to offer excellent experiences for clerks during Positioning Integration, Evaluation, Research/Review session (PIERs), and our local PIER I, II, III director, Dr. Joanna Middleton, as well as our PIER IV director, Dr. Alexa Smith, are to be commended for their strong leadership and commitment.

As our undergraduate curriculum continues to evolve, we at DMNB are in an excellent position to provide our students with excellent clinical opportunities across all of our sites; the dedication of our faculty and staff in NB continue to be one of our strongest assets.



Curriculum

Public Engagement

DMNB programs are dependent on the engagement of the community volunteers and other members of the community who enable students to develop their clinical skills. Fourteen

of the 68 volunteers were new for the 2016-2017 academic year. Simulated patients totalled 147. Of these, 24 were new.



Lectures delivered

The DMNB program is aiming to have 25 per cent of all lectures for the undergraduate medical education program delivered from New Brunswick. Faculty development and engagement at the distributed sites is a major component of the numbers.

Service Learning Program

Each year students in Med II have the option of undertaking an optional course for credit which combines their medical learning with community service.

The Service Learning Program integrates community engagement concepts into classroom-based learning (Professional Competencies I) in their first year with an optional community-based project experience in their second year.

Students who opt to take part in the program do a minimum of 20 hours in order to complete the service learning experience over the academic year. They apply for the program and are matched with community-based not-for-profit organizations, or develop their own experiences based on existing partnerships they have.

The focus of the experience is working with marginalized and underserved populations. It includes preparation, critical reflection assignments and a project deliverable that is relevant and useful for the community partner and their

clients. Projects are designed in collaboration with community partners (including staff and people who use their services) and the university (students, staff and Faculty).

Currently, 16 students from DMNB are taking part in the Service Learning Program and are completing their service learning experience over the next year with six community-based organizations or programs. These include organizations who do mentorship and education with underserved youth, harm reduction with people who use drugs and also with people living with HIV and/or Hepatitis C, community programming at a health centre and healthcare advocacy.

Current projects are focused on working to reduce barriers to healthcare access for underserved and marginalized peoples, advocacy for healthcare policy changes, and knowledge exchange and mobilization events that bring together intersectoral and community-campus partnership and dialogue.

Two students hoping to impact policy to help teens

Med II students Natasha Larivee and Natalie Wallace are doing their Service Learning Project with Dr. Marianne McKenna, a pediatrician in Saint John. For their project, Natasha and Natalie are looking at the need and policy impact of having a form of birth control, known as 'The Patch' included in the Province's funding formulary for those on social assistance.

Both strong advocates of a woman's ability to choose her preferred form of birth control, they argue that access to the Patch could help reduce unwanted teen pregnancy significantly for marginalized youth who do not have a stable home life or are homeless. The Patch takes is discreet and worn for a week at a time which reduces some of the issues that are associated with oral birth control, such as storage and taking daily at a specified time. It also provides an alternative for those whom the other forms of birth control (which are covered by the plan) may not work.

Working with the Teen Pregnancy Network Natasha and Natalie are discussing the need for this change, how wide the impact could be and what steps need to be taken. The organizations they are working with are benefiting through having them take on a research and adocacy role for an issue they may not have time or funding for.

For the 2016-2017academic year the representatives were Laura Faulkner (Class 2019) and Samantha Bland (Class 2020).

One session was organized in September with Dr. Robert Stevenson speaking about Addressing stress and its affects; Benefit of nuitrition to stress related illness.





Research

The past academic year has been very successful for the DMNB research program. We celebrated the successful MSc thesis defenses of three of our graduate students – Ming Han (UNB), Purvi Trivedi (Dal), and Ashley Eadie (Dal).

Our researchers were successful in obtaining over \$7M in new research funding, from prestigious and highly competitive sources including CIHR, the Terry Fox Research Institute, the Heart and Stroke Foundation of Canada, and the New Brunswick Health Research Foundation.

Our research team has grown with this new funding, enabling us to do more cutting-edge work in the areas of cardiovascular disease, oncology and occupational medicine.

Dr. Keith Brunt was our first research faculty member to achieve tenure, having also been promoted to the rank of Associate Professor.

Dr. Thomas Pulinilkunnil was awarded a prestigious new investigator award and establishment grant from Diabetes Canada totaling over \$700,000.

DMNB is the lead coordinating and biobanking site for the UNB-led \$5M Terry Fox pan-Canadian Multiple Myeloma Molecular Monitoring (M4) Study. Dr. Reiman also received the \$1M CIHR SPOR - NBHRF Mentorship Chair

in Innovative Cancer Clinical Trials.

Dr. Petra Kienesberger received a \$75,000 grant to support her work in obesity and heart disease from NBHRF, the Heart and Stroke Foundation of New Brunswick and DMNB.

Dr. Anil Adisesh, the J.D. Irving, Limited Chair in Occupational Medicine at DMNB, continued his leading research and educational initiatives that are well regarded internationally as evidenced by his prominent role with the World Health Organization.


Our research team has been active in training the next generation of health researchers including Dal Med RIM students, undergraduate summer research students, MSc and PhD students and postdoctoral fellows.

We are partnering with the Province of New Brunswick, the Horizon Health Network, Dalhousie Medicine Nova Scotia, the Maritime SPOR SUPPORT Unit and the University of New Brunswick to carry out world-class health research that benefits the health of New Brunswickers and Maritimers, in keeping with the DalMedForward strategic plan for the Faculty of Medicine.



Administration of funding received in fiscal year end 2017.


