A. Background & Purpose

This guideline outlines the process to follow if a student suffers an injury in their clinical placement (i.e, needle stick injury, exposure to blood or body fluids, etc.).

B. Application

This guideline applies to all enrolled undergraduate medical students in all years, including visiting elective students.

C. Definitions

- Entering students refers to those admitted to the undergraduate medicine program.
- **Returning students** are students returning to Pre-Clerkship, Clerkship or Med 5.
- Visiting elective student refers to any student working in a Dalhousie-affiliated clinical setting for a clerskhip elective who is registered in an MD Program at another medical school
- An enrolled student is any student actively registered and participating in the program.
- **Occupational Health Safety and Wellness** refers to the office in the Nova Scotia Health Authority that addresses workplace safety and exposures for faculty, staff, and learners.
- **Employee Health** refers to the office in the Horizon Health Network that addresses workplace safety and exposures for faculty, staff, and learners.
- Occupational Health, Safety & Wellness refers to the office in Health PEI that addresses workplace safety and exposures for faculty, staff, and learners.
- **HIV** refers to the Human Immunodeficiency Virus.
- **Hep B** is the Hepatitis B Virus.

D. Guideline

Students will receive support once they report a workplace exposure. It is a common experience for health care workers at all levels of training and practice.

E. Procedures

Students should report immediately to clinical leader, charge person or supervisor who will direct the student to Occupational Health, Safety and Wellness at Nova Scotia Health and Health PEI or Employee Health at Horizon Health Network, the Emergency Department, or an on---call physician for bloodwork and consideration of HIV post-exposure prophylaxis or Hep B Immune Globulin

Students should report the incident to Student Affairs Office, Dalhousie Medical School.
