

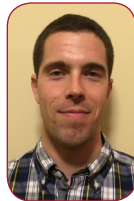
WELCOME

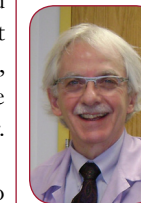
The following Department members made recent media headlines.

NEW RESEARCH ON SEDENTARY BEHAVIOR



Researcher, **Dr. Olga Theou** talked to CBC Information Morning about her new study on sedentary behavior. Her study finds that sedentary time increases the risk of death for middle-aged and older people who are frail and inactive but does not appear to increase the risk for non-frail people who are inactive. 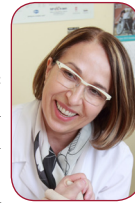


NEW APPOINTMENTS

He is an examiner in Neurology for the Royal College, and served as Chief Examiner for the CSCN EMG Examination. Dr. Grant is an Associate Professor and active in undergraduate and postgraduate teaching. His research interests include diabetic neuropathy and ALS.

Dr. Amra Saric has been appointed Interim Head of the Division of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation. Dr. Saric has been a physician and member of the Dalhousie Faculty of Medicine since 2003. She is an Associate Professor within the Faculty of Medicine and the Residency Training Program Director since 2007. 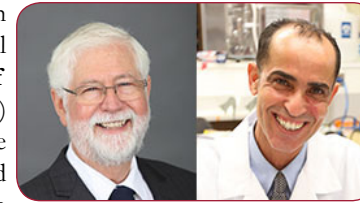


RESEARCH NEWS

DR. PETER HULL RECEIVES \$415,000 GRANT; FIRST CANADIAN RESEARCHER RECIPIENT

Dr. Peter Hull, with the Department of Medicine's Division of Clinical Dermatology and Cutaneous Science, is a recent recipient of a \$415,000 grant from the Leo Foundation. The foundation is focused on promoting worldwide dermatological research.

The grant supports research being conducted by Dr. Hull together with **Dr. Youssef Elhaji** (molecular geneticist) working in the Hull lab. They are studying well described inherited skin conditions associated with abnormal peeling.



In this study, Dr. Hull will collaborate with Dalhousie colleagues Dr. Graham Dellaire (Department of Pathology) and Dr. John Frampton (School of Biomedical Engineering) as well as with international affiliates in South Africa, Norway and the Netherlands.

Dr. Hull and his team are the first Canadian researchers to receive a grant from the foundation based out of Denmark.

PUBLISHED!

Drs. Shelly A. McNeil (Division of Infectious Diseases) and **Melissa Andrew** (Division of Geriatric Medicine) were recently published in the Journal of Infectious Diseases.



The paper, *The Importance of Frailty in the Assessment of Influenza Vaccine Effectiveness Against Influenza-Related Hospitalization in Elderly People* was highlighted as the Editor's Choice and accompanied by an editorial written by a prominent influenza expert.

MEASURING WHAT MATTERS: FRAILTY IN NOVA SCOTIA

Dr. Olga Theou, Division of Geriatric Medicine, has been awarded an Establishment Grant from the Nova Scotia Health Research Foundation for her project: *Measuring what matters: Frailty in Nova Scotia*. The grant is valued at \$149,988 (over three years). The establishment grants are intended to assist building research capacity and support new Nova Scotia health researchers.

Dr. Ransom never judges and has always made it known that he can appreciate how much work it is. He made a point today to tell me how amazing he thinks that I am doing and pointed out to his residents that what I have been doing isn't easy. For all my efforts and stress that most people do not recognize or see - it felt so gratifying for it to be acknowledged.
