Dalhousie has continued to be involved with the maternal and newborn project lead by Western University: TSAM (Training, Support and Access Model for MNCH in Rwanda and Burundi. This project is funded through Global Affairs Canada (formerly DFATD) and addresses "Partnerships for Strengthening Maternal, Newborn and Child Health". The project timeline is April 2015 to March 2020. After some initial delays the project has now taken shape and is being implemented. It is multifaceted addressing both pre and post service needs of care providers in Rwanda with a strong emphasis on mentorship. Political unrest has led to delays with project implementation in Burundi although meetings with key individuals in Burundi have taken place. Thus far two courses have been run with new interns to prepare them to provide emergency obstetrical and newborn care. In addition, a mentorship workshop has taken place to train Rwandan mentors and they are now, as multidisciplinary teams, visiting health centres monthly providing support, training and expert review. A second mentorship workshop is planned for late September. In addition, emphasis is now being place on simulation and drills as a teaching and mentorship tool and expertise from Dalhousie will be provided in the coming months. The project also addresses the importance of inter-professional collaboration and ethical and gender issues and acknowledges that these underpin the entire project (described as the cross cutting themes). Members of the Dalhousie team will be in Rwanda in August and again in September.

An Update on Outreach Clinics Jocelyn Stairs

"The Global Health Interest Group has been active in serving our local community through several initiatives over the past academic year.

We continued to build on the vision and hard work of several graduating R-5s by staffing monthly well women's clinics to help ensure patients served by the Refugee Health Clinic, primarily Syrian refugees, had timely access to PAP smears and contraceptive counselling after arriving in Canada. We also hosted monthly clinics serving Mobile Outreach Street Health (MOSH) clients with PAP smear and STI testing services in collaboration with the North End Community Health Centre and the MOSH team.

We have continued to expand our reach in our education initiatives by collaborating with several facets of the Phoenix Youth Programs to provide informal Q&A sessions for their clients. We are excited by the robust interest in and commitment to local global health and social justice initiatives by the current residency group. Going forward next year, we hope to invest time in meeting with our stakeholders to ensure that our programming is best meeting the needs of our community in a sustainable and value-added manner. "
