New Mental Health Unit Open in Saint John

Atlantic Health Sciences Corporation (AHSC), now part of Regional Health Authority B, opened the newly renovated and redesigned 4 D North Mental Health Unit at the Saint John Regional Hospital in September 2008.

The renovation was funded by the Board of Directors of the former AHSC, the Saint John Regional Hospital Foundation and MindCare New Brunswick.

The new unit offers decor, colour, and design that is aimed at being home-like, relaxing, comfortable, and more inviting

than a typical hospital atmosphere. Safety is a critical component of this unit. The nursing station and open concept provide a full view of patient activity areas and can provide the patients with a sense of support from staff.

In addition, upgrades have been made to the emergency alarm/nurse call system with a monitor feature to decrease the opportunity for elopements from the unit. There is also a new family room, laundry facilities for patient use, a beauty salon, and a new exercise room

along with improved access to outside windows, offering exterior views in both patient care and activity areas.

Dr. Rachel Morehouse spoke on behalf of the Mental Health Program at the opening. "The redevelopment of this space is very patient focused. We will be able to optimally provide a wide range of care from inpatient services to emergency and short stay services," said Dr. Morehouse. "Our physicians and staff can look forward to being able to offer our patients the best possible care."





Message from the Head

The front-page story in this issue of Headlines covers the new acute inpatient psychiatry unit at the Saint John Regional Hospital. I had the opportunity to visit this state-of-theart facility last fall during Mental Illness Awareness Week and I have been singing its praises ever since. As mentioned in the article, the unit is spacious, attractive and very well designed, highly therapeutic for the patients, and very positive for staff. As we engage in the renovation of the Abbie J. Lane Building, the Saint John psychiatry unit represents a level of excellence that we will try to emulate. During my visit to Saint John, I was also fortunate to be present when Dr. Jane Murphy presented the inaugural Dr. Alexander Leighton Memorial Lecture — Dr. Murphy's talk was clear and memorable, another example of excellence. Beyond these very encouraging developments in our specialty, medicine in Saint John is clearly in a very dynamic phase with the establishment of the New Brunswick Dalhousie medical campus, and the Saint John component of our Department will grow substantially in the coming years.

This month we extend warm welcomes to two new psychiatrists: **Dr. Tanya Tulipan** to the newly re-established acute inpatient unit on 6 Lane and **Dr. Jason Morrison** to the Cole Harbour community mental health clinic. You can read brief biosketches of

each on page 9 and should soon have the chance to meet them.

Our residency program is thriving, with excellence demonstrated not only in the knowledge of psychiatry (e.g., shown in the excellent results on the COPE examination and Royal College exams) but also in sport (see report on the soccer team on page 10) and in artistic production — the resident production at the Christmas party was first rate and very witty indeed. I have to agree with Dr. Michael Stubbs that the residents are an Awesomely Awesome group! We are currently in the season of CaRMS interviews, and on January 19th, candidates, staff, residents, and faculty managed to brave the adverse weather conditions and overcome flight cancellations for a successful first day of interviews.

As described on page 5, the collaboration between **Drs. Brad Kelln**, **Scott Theriault** and **Bianca Lauria-Horner** of the Department of Psychiatry and the Canadian Police Knowledge Network has resulted in the development of an important new e-learning module for law enforcement officers. This program has been piloted and will soon be introduced for general use across the country. We can anticipate that this program will provide great assistance to the "psychiatrists in blue," and have a significant and salutary impact on practice.

The AFP negotiations have reached a fairly high level of intensity, with an



average of one meeting a week (bilateral or all-parties) in January — stay tuned! Functional planning is well underway for the renovation of the Abbie J. Lane Building and the construction of the new community-focused living units to be built on the site of Simpson Hall. The coming summer should see Simpson Hall razed and this fall should see the new community-focused units being built.

Thus much is underway in our Department and we are fortunate to have such strengths within the Department and our partners in the Mental Health Program, and such support from outside. By working together, we will be able to achieve great things.

The collage featured in the banner will be the new "image" for the Department, will become the front page photo for the website, and will also be used in other promotional materials.



Recognition of Emotionally Disturbed Persons

An introductory e-learning course to help first responders manage situations involving emotionally disturbed persons

Over the last 30 years, deinstitutionalization, which favours treating patients in the community rather than in psychiatric hospitals, has placed higher demands on first response services. The number of contacts front line responders have with emotionally disturbed persons (EDPs) has increased substantially. They are required to assess, manage, and diffuse situations involving individuals in crisis. These cases can be stressful, demanding, and very challenging. There is a recognized need for training to help responders appropriately manage these situations.

Every case has the potential to reach a crisis point and risk the safety of the person involved, bystanders, and responders to the scene. When an encounter results in injury or death, the tactics used by police are often scrutinized. The ability of first responders to recognize EDPs from those with criminal intent and apply appropriate response strategies is essential for de-escalating these types of

situations and preventing victimization of involved individuals.

This project was initiated by Dalhousie University's Department of Psychiatry with the support of the Nova Scotia Department of Justice, the Community Mobilization Program, Public Safety and Emergency Preparedness Canada, Janssen-Ortho Pharmaceuticals, Schizophrenia Society of Nova Scotia, Delta Hotels, and the law enforcement community. The program was developed on the basis that a first responder's role is not to identify or diagnose mental illness, but rather to use their strong observational skills to categorize EDPs according to the presenting behaviours, how to interpret this information, and subsequently how to manage the situation depending on which category of EDP officers are faced

Following a successful training pilot delivered by East Coast Forensic Hospital, clinical and forensic psychologist **Dr. Brad Kelln** and clinical

and forensic psychiatrist Dr. Scott **Theriault**. the Department of Psychiatry entered into a partnership with Canadian Police Knowledge Network (CPKN) in order to make available the education program to first responders across Canada. CPKN is Canada's leading provider of online training solutions for police officers. Drs. Brad Kelln, Scott Theriault and Bianca Lauria-Horner have worked collaboratively with CPKN in order to adapt the education program as a two-four hour e-learning option for law enforcement agencies. The e-learning format is in its final stages of review conducted by officers from law enforcement agencies. The review will be used to collect learner feedback on the course as well as attitudes. toward e-learning which will be applied to further enhance the program. We are expecting to announce the official launch in early March 2009.

 Where were you born?
 Prague, Czechoslovakia
 When did you come to Dalhousie University?

I came to Dalhousie University in 2003. Previously I had an appointment as an assistant professor at the Department of Child Psychiatry at Charles University in Prague and I was trained as a Fullbright Fellow by Dr. Fred Volkmar at the Yale Child Study Centre.

3. What are your current positions? I am an assistant professor of psychiatry at Dalhousie University and a staff psychiatrist at the IWK Health Centre, Division of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry.

4. What are your current research interests?

I am interested in co-morbid psychiatric disorders in school-age children and adolescents with autism. I am also interested in studying atypical depressive symptoms in depressive episodes among offspring of bipolar parents (as part of the high-risk study).

5. What research projects are you currently participating in?
I have been the principal investigator in a project funded by Dalhousie University Department of Psychiatry Research Fund entitled "Anxiety and depression in autism spectrum disorders: A pilot study." I am also collaborating with Drs. Anne Duffy, Martin Alda, and Tomas

Hajek in a project funded by a CIHR Operating Grant on the longitudinal study of adolescents and young children of bipolar parents.

6. Why did you choose psychiatry? While in medical school, I really enjoyed my undergraduate elective in psychiatry

and psychotherapy. That experience had a major influence on my decision to choose psychiatry as my specialty.

7. What was your second career choice?

It was internal medicine.

8. What experience best prepared you for your job?

I've been lucky enough to work in several different inpatient units and clinics both in Europe and North America, which has been a great learning experience.

9. Who was and is your mentor? I've been very fortunate to have several wonderful mentors through my training, but if I had to name one, it would be Dr. Vladimir Hort. He had a major influence on me both personally and professionally. Regarding my subspecialty, it would be Dr. Fred Volkmar (autism), and Dr. Martin Alda (high-risk study in bipolar disorder). 10. What do you consider the biggest challenge facing researchers today? Of course, any researcher would wish to have more time for conducting research but I think the current AFP in the Department provides an excellent opportunity for psychiatrists interested in clinical work, research, and teaching.

Next Steps for the Guyana-Dalhousie Partnership

In December 2008 a team from the Department of Psychiatry travelled to Guyana to review collaborative opportunities to assist the Guyana Ministry of Health to build community and primary care capacity to meet the continuum of population mental health needs. The focus was on developing partnerships with established programs in the Department that would infuse new energy and innovation into what we do here, while providing Guyana with foundational seeds to plant, nurture, and grow within the Guyana context.

Dr. Jim Millar was able to observe Guyana's health care system up close and identified many areas where we can help and also many areas where we can learn — both within and outside the sphere of mental health. Dr. Millar states that "Guyana is a leader in the traditional area of public health infectious disease control. It has managed to greatly reduce the incidence of AIDS and malaria through education and simple interventions. They have developed a system where they can treat prophylactically or immunize the entire nation within a 24-48 hour period.

"This has been shown during the frequent flooding that occurs and the reduction of waterborne illnesses. All this has been done with an annual health budget of less than \$40 million." He goes on to say that Guyana "also has the leadership to be able to move their system forward. The Ministry of Health has very capable people at all levels of management and has developed partnerships with others to improve the delivery of primary care services."

Ms. Nancy Beck had the opportunity to visit residential facilities for orphaned children — many of whom suffer from both mental and physical disabilities — and to visit the country's national mental hospital. She states that "the opportunities for learning and sharing knowledge are extensive. The Guyanese

people are curious, open, and dedicated to improving the services in their country. Our team's experience there has caused us to reflect on the role we each play in our home communities and in understanding our global responsibility."

The discussions with our partners in Guyana were fruitful and provocative and forced us all to sit and reflect on common system challenges:

- What is the existing natural community infrastructure that can be mobilized to support mental health?
- How does the health sector engage government and nongovernment organizations, faith-based groups, clients, families, and the community in the prevention and promotion of mental health and in the collaborative provision of support services?
- How can working from an "abundance model" as apposed to a "scarcity model" shape our perceived barriers to change?
- How do you address the paradox between the need for consistent and evidence-based standards of care and the unique predicament, context, priorities, and choices of the clients, families, and communities?

Our partnership with Guyana in 2009 will focus on the following priority areas:

- Developing a strategy to transform the National Psychiatric Hospital into a therapeutic community with both residential and outpatient facilities
- Embedding Mental Health Care Self-Management into Primary Care
- Developing a strategy for suicide prevention
- Building substance abuse

- treatment and prevention capacity
- Drafting modern Mental Health legislation
- Building community capacity to provide care for children and youth exposed to community violence

As we move forward we will keep you updated on progress made and lessons learned.

I am pleased to announce that our team continues to grow. Yifeng Wei and Alan McLuckie will be working with our group as Research Assistants. Yifeng has a MA in Education from York University with a specialty in school physical health research and will be co-leading our school mental health initiatives. Alan is a social worker currently pursuing his PhD at the University of Toronto and will be working on a national child and youth mental health strategy project.

Looking forward, a major focus for the Chair will be addressing school mental health. With most children and youth

spending about 30 hours a week in the classroom, the school environment is an ideal place to begin the work of addressing the mental health needs of young people. Not only does the school offer a simple and cost-effective way of reaching youth, but it is also a convenient

place where mental health can be linked with other aspects of health, such as physical health, and with learning.

One of the ways that schools can address mental health needs in schools is through the creation of mental health promotion strategies, such as curriculum development and implementation. Last year the Chair helped develop a Mental Health and High School Curriculum Guide in partnership with the Canadian Mental Health Association. This year we have developed an accompanying mental health training program for teachers. The training will be given to educators in four pilot sites across Canada. The project will then evaluate whether the curriculum and teacher training had a positive effect on the knowledge and attitudes of school staff and students. This project will advance our understanding about whether curriculum implementation and teacher training may be an effective, evidencebased strategy to enhance mental health literacy in schools.

Another opportunity for the Chair to enhance mental health in schools is through a needs assessment and evaluation of school-based Youth Health Centres. Starting in 2009 Judy Elliot (Director, Mental Health and Addictions at the IWK Health Centre) and I will take the lead on an initiative to improve the linkages between school-based Youth Health Centres and services offered by Mental Health and Addictions at the IWK.

Finally, in an effort to work more closely with the education community,

the Chair has established an Educator Advisory Group. Joining the group are key members from the Department of Education, Nova Scotia Teacher's Union, Capital District Health Authority, IWK Health Centre, as well as principals, guidance counsellors, and teachers.

The purpose of the EAG will be to advise the Chair on how to enhance mental health in schools. This is a great opportunity for us to discuss relevant issues and develop a framework to address school mental health needs.

Building on this advisory model, the Chair has also re-established its Youth Advisory Group with help from Andy Cox, Mental Health Patient Advocate at the IWK Health Centre. The Youth Advisory Group's primary role will be to advise the Chair on what resources to develop to address mental health problems in young people. The group will also provide feedback about projects we are developing.

As you know one of our signature projects has been the *Transitions* book. With media coverage from Live at Five, Breakfast Television, and articles in Moods Magazine and University Affairs, we were able to take the *Transitions* project to the next level. The resource for post-secondary students was offered to universities and colleges across

Canada. So far 14 institutions have purchased and are using *Transitions*, which has generated over \$30,000 to help fund future Chair projects that will enhance the mental health of youth. All of this work has been led by Jacqueline Boucher and assistant Nancy Green who have done an amazing job in creating and promoting this resource. In fact, the project has been so successful that we are now looking at ways to market *Transitions* in the US and UK.

With all our projects and programs in development the teenmentalhealth. org website has become an important promotional tool for us. The site is a place where people can access and download resources we have created. Our website and my new blog are opportunities to provide evidence-based information on adolescent mental health to youth, parents, patients, health professionals, and anyone else that visits us online. **David Venn** is to be congratulated for his excellent work in advancing the development of the website.

One new resource available for download on our site is an evidence-based medicine guide for patients. The EBM guide provides patients with a comprehensive understanding of the scientific basis for medical treatments (biological, psychological, social) and how to communicate with their health care provider when discussing medication and other treatment options. The next phase of this project will be to create a youth version of the guide and offer it to consumer groups across Canada.

Clearly we have our work cut out for us for 2009. But with our two new employees, the other dedicated members of our team, and our expanding community partnerships, I am confident and excited about the direction the Chair is moving.

Announcing the Nova Scotia Psychosis Research Unit

The first meeting of the Nova Scotia Psychosis Research Unit (NSPRU) took place in December 2008. This unit has representation from a variety of fields of study including community stakeholders. All who attended were very excited about the formation of this unit and look forward to the possibilities that can occur with a defined multidisciplinary collaborative team.

The formation of this unit was spearheaded by Dr. Phil Tibbo, the Dr. Paul Janssen Chair in Psychotic Disorders, in recognition of the benefits a multidisciplinary team could have on psychosis research in Nova Scotia. Active and successful psychosis research programs currently exist within Dalhousie University and CDHA. While there has been collaboration between the region's researchers in recent years, there remains a need for a more coordinated research agenda for psychosis and its co-morbidities. This partnership will allow for optimization of resources and enable competition for finite research funding (both nationally and internationally), and at the same time foster a unique multidisciplinary research environment for students at all levels. The aim of this collaborative venture is to further our understanding of psychosis and its co-morbidities

in order to find ways to reduce the suffering and improve outcomes in the affected individuals and their families.

The following individuals currently constitute the NSPRU: Drs. Sabina Abidi, Steven Ayer, David Gardner, Kim Good, Ron Leslie, Heather Milliken, George Robertson, Harry Robertson, Xiaowei Song, Sherry Stewart, Michael Teehan, Phil Tibbo, Zenovia Ursuliak, and David Whitehorn. This list is not exhaustive, nor exclusive. As the NSPRU will cover psychosis through the lifespan, representation from the IWK and rehabilitation is welcomed. Also

recognized would be active partners of the NSPRU such as the NRC-IBD (Atlantic) group (neuroimaging), the Brain Repair Center, the Neuroscience Institute, and psychiatrists and GPs working clinically in psychosis, in addition to graduate students, postdoctoral fellows, and other research staff. Congratulations

Publication in The Canadian Journal of Psychiatry

Congratulations to **Drs. Stephen Kisely**, **Joseph Sadek**, and their co-authors on their recent article in *The Canadian Journal of Psychiatry*. "Excess Cancer Mortality in Psychiatric Patients" was published in the November 2008 issue and their work was profiled in the November 26, 2008 issue of the Chronicle-Herald and the January 13, 2009 issue of the Globe and Mail.

This new Canadian research showed that the death rate from cancer for mental health patients is 65% higher than for patients in the general population.

Dr. Sadek was quoted in the Globe and Mail, saying "The results are shocking. Stigma is still a very big problem. It interferes with the doctor-patient relationship and with care."

"This is a population that doesn't complain much about their physical ailments. They have other problems."

He also said that the results of the research should prompt physicians to make a special effort to ask questions about the physical health of their mental health patients.
