A Champion of Mental Health

Dr. Phil Tibbo receives prestigious award from CAMIMH

Dr. Phil Tibbo has received another well-earned accolade. In early April he was named a 2017 Champion of Mental Health by the Canadian Alliance on Mental Illness and Mental Health (CAMIMH). The annual Champions Awards celebrate individuals and organizations whose outstanding contributions

have advanced the mental health agenda in Canada in the past year. Dr. Tibbo was named a Champion in the researcher/clinician category and was celebrated along with the other winners, including Stone Hearth Bakery of Halifax, on May 3 at a gala in Ottawa.

Dr. Tibbo has been very successful in developing, fostering and promoting psychosis research programs in Canada. In 2002, supported by a donation to the University of Alberta, Dr. Tibbo formed, established and directed the Bebensee Schizophrenia Research Unit (BSRU), where he significantly expanded schizophrenia

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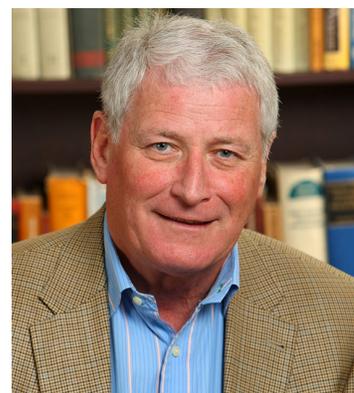
Message from the Head

research in Edmonton and Alberta as a whole. Multidisciplinary clinical research grants resulted, supporting not only neuroimaging (his primary research area), but also collaborative research in cognition, genetics, addictions, and public health and health promotion. Dr. Tibbo also developed and directed the clinical arm of the BSRU: the Edmonton Early Psychosis Intervention Clinic (EPIPIC). This remains a vital and highly recognized regional first-episode psychosis clinic with a strong research focus.

In 2008 Dr. Tibbo accepted the Dr. Paul Janssen Chair in Psychotic Disorders in the Department of Psychiatry at Dalhousie University, with the expectation that he establish and foster world-class research into the etiology of schizophrenia and other psychotic disorders, with a particular focus on the early phase of psychotic illness. In addition to successful continuation of his neuroimaging work, Dr. Tibbo has been able to foster a fruitful multidisciplinary psychosis research environment in Nova Scotia with an impressive depth and breadth of research. This includes not only studies investigating the biological underpinnings of psychosis, but also: pathways to mental health care; education delivery models for family members; mindfulness and arts-based therapies in first episode psychosis; and cannabis and other comorbid addiction investigations in psychosis. Dr. Tibbo established

the Nova Scotia Psychosis Research Unit (NSPRU), a partnership allowing for optimization of resources for research funding while fostering a unique multidisciplinary research environment for learners at all levels. His vision of the NSPRU has also resulted in the unit financially supporting summer studentships in psychosis since 2013.

Nationally, Dr. Tibbo's clinical research and leadership excellence is also recognized. Of note, he is a founding member and executive director of the Canadian Consortium for Early Intervention in Psychosis, an organization that has published and developed clinical recommendations, clinical tools (e.g., relapse prediction tools and side effect monitoring tools), and educational products for early intervention services. He is also the chair of the Schizophrenia Society of Canada Foundation (SSCF), established in 1994 when the late Dr. Michael Smith made a generous donation of half of his Nobel Prize Laureate monies to the SSC. Dr. Tibbo ensures that the SSCF remains committed to fostering and supporting research in all areas related to schizophrenia (e.g., biological, psychological, and social) to ensure that recovery is possible. Chris Summerville, the CEO of the SSC, says Dr. Tibbo is invaluable to his team. "His work has significantly added to our understanding of psychosis, improved lives of individuals living with psychosis and their families, shaped policy through

advocacy, and indeed has "made a difference " at the national level," he says.

Dr. Tibbo has worked tirelessly to disseminate his research to the general public. He has developed public education campaigns (e.g. www.weedmyths.ca), received knowledge sharing grants, been asked to write position statements for national organizations such as the CPA and CCEIP (www.epicanada.org), and been a scientific advisor to community agencies such as Drug Free Kids Canada. His leadership as a clinician and researcher has been recognized by being named director of the Nova Scotia Early Psychosis Program, fellow of the CPA, president of the Canadian Consortium for Early Intervention in Psychosis, and by receiving the 2015 Michael Smith Award from the SSC.

Dr. Tibbo's accomplishments and dedication as a clinical researcher in schizophrenia are quite evident in his publications, his success in obtaining peer-reviewed grant funding, his awards, his supervision of graduate students, and requests that he be a guest speaker. His leadership and superior ability to develop clinical research collaborations and teams has truly advanced schizophrenia research in Canada. Congratulations to Dr. Tibbo on his most recent honour, Champion of Mental Health. We know it is richly deserved.

meet a researcher: dr. alissa pencer

My current research interests: My current research interests are fairly broad in scope, but mostly falling within prevention and intervention of mental health and addictions issues in youth and young adults. More specifically, populations I am interested in include youth/young adults with, or at risk for, severe mental illness, anxiety disorders, and obsessive-compulsive disorder.

Research projects I'm currently participating in: I am involved in several projects in collaboration with graduate students in clinical psychology and other members in the department of psychiatry: 1) Personality Vulnerability and Motives for Substance Use (Alcohol and Cannabis) in Early Psychosis Patients; 2) Skills for Wellness (SWELL): Cognitive-behavioural therapy skills for psychotic-like experiences and basic symptoms in children and adolescents; 3) Impact of an Early Psychosis Program on cognitive functioning: An examination of time and sex differences in the first six months of treatment; 4) CBTI self-help: A scoping review; and 5) Developing

a fall weekend camp for youth with OCD: A program development, pilot test, and evaluation.

A typical "Day in My Work Life": It is hard to say what a "typical" day is like as it can vary day-to-day. Most days start with either teaching

a class in clinical or developmental psychology (can be graduate or undergraduate), or a meeting of some sort. I typically have at least one meeting with a graduate student to discuss research or clinical supervision. On a fairly regular basis I am also meeting with my research collaborators or communicating with them overall (several) emails. The rest of the day is interspersed with preparing lectures, marking assignments, and reviewing/ answering emails. I have one whole day devoted to private practice where I do Cognitive Behaviour Therapy with youth and young adults primarily with anxiety, obsessive-compulsive disorder, or depression.

What I wish I knew (but didn't) when I first contemplated becoming a researcher: Given I work within a scientist-practitioner model, I wish I had known how difficult it can be to balance research with clinical and teaching responsibilities.

The most satisfying and most frustrating aspects of doing research: The most satisfying aspect of doing research for me is getting to ask and answer questions that can make a meaningful difference in the lives of the people we work with. The most frustrating aspect of doing research is trying to get funding for the projects.

The experience that best prepared me for my position: I don't think I can pinpoint a particular experience that best prepared me for my position. It was the culmination of experiences throughout my graduate training, residency, and work at the IWK Health Centre for many years that has prepared me for my current position at Dalhousie.

My research mentor: My PhD supervisor, Dr. Jean Addington, was and continues to be one of my research mentors. I greatly appreciated how she integrated her research and clinical practice.

My second career choice: My "legitimate" second career choice was psychiatry. My "dream" second career choice was/is to be a travel agent.

MEDICAL STUDENT PSYCHSIGN REFLECTION: HEIDI BENTLEY'S (MED 3)

Each year a med student is sponsored by the department to attend the psychSIGN conference as part of APA. This year we sent Heidi Bentley. She reflects on the experience below.

At the end of May, I had the pleasure of attending the 12th Annual PsychSIGN conference in sunny San Diego, California. PsychSIGN is a student-led psychiatry interest group network. This student led conference was held in conjunction with the annual American Psychiatry Association Conference.

The day began with a wonderful introduction from the incoming president of the APA. It was a hopeful and encouraging address, highlighting the challenges and changes psychiatry will face in the future. The conference was filled with diverse presentations from psychiatrists across North America and beyond. A workshop on creating a memorable CV and a residency panel with various program directors were also available. Physician and trainee wellness and preventing burn-out were common themes throughout the day. Psychiatrists have an

interesting role to play in physician wellness, as their position exists in a dual role: taking care of themselves, as well as the role of looking after fellow colleagues, something I had never considered.

Discussing these relevant and important topics in medicine with various fellow medical students was a wonderful experience! Despite completing our medical training in different parts of the world, we share much common ground and it was refreshing to engage in conversations about psychiatry.

The presentation that resonated the most with me was on microaggression. impact on the target person or group.” It is something that we have all done, experienced, and witnessed no matter what stage of our training. How to deal with such complex situations is critical, as we as students have an important role to play, as we can foster an environment that curbs microaggressions.

The conference concluded with a subspecialty dinner. Various specialties such as forensics, child and adolescent, and addictions were represented by psychiatrists, and we were able to discuss with them their chosen specialty.

I had a wonderful time at PsychSIGN and would like to thank the Psychiatry Department at Dalhousie for the opportunity. This weekend provided a powerful glimpse into what a career in psychiatry has to offer and has encouraged me to continue to explore psychiatry.

Chaired by **Dr. Heather Milliken**, the morning session consisted of a presentation by keynote speaker Dr. Laurence Kirmayer from McGill University on





10TH ANNUAL ATLANTIC PROVINCES CHILD & ADOLESCENT PSYCHIATRY CONFERENCE

The 10th Annual Atlantic Provinces Child and Adolescent Psychiatry Conference took place May 26 to 28 at the lovely White Point Beach Resort. This year's conference was very well attended by over 25 child and adolescent psychiatrists from across the province. The theme of this year's conference was Transitions in Youth Mental Health,

focusing on transitions across the lifespan in areas such as education, clinical service delivery, community outreach and research.

Our keynote speaker was Dr. Ashok Malla, professor of psychiatry at McGill University. Dr. Malla holds a Tier 1 Canada Research Chair in Early Psychosis, with a cross appointment in Department of Epidemiology, and is an editor of the Journal of Social Psychiatry and Psychiatric Epidemiology. He is the Nominated Principal Investigator of a \$25M grant for a national research project on transformation of youth mental health services in Canada (ACCESS Open Minds), funded jointly by the Graham Boeckh Foundation and CIHR under the Strategies for Patient Oriented Research (SPOR). Dr. Malla's presentation, "Transforming Youth

Report from the Sun Life Financial Chair in Adolescent Mental Health

DR. STAN KUTCHER, SUN LIFE FINANCIAL CHAIR IN ADOLESCENT MENTAL HEALTH

The past few months have been busy for the Chair, with members of the team conducting training sessions worldwide. **Drs. Stan Kutcher** and Yifeng Wei spent some time in China working and training with their team and Dr. Kutcher completed the last of three visits to Newfoundland where training of all student support staff in the province began earlier this year.

In June, at both the Halifax Central Library and Holland College, the team hosted groups of post-secondary faculty eager to learn more about mental health within their student body. The *LIST (Listen, Identify, Support and Treat): A Comprehensive Mental Health Development and Pathway to Mental Health Care for Post-Secondary Settings Go-To Faculty Training* is being implemented into six colleges and universities in Atlantic Canada. Before this can happen, faculty from St. Mary’s University, Mount Saint Vincent University, Nova Scotia Community College, St. Francis Xavier University, Mount Allison University and Holland College have to be represented and trained by Dr. Kutcher in order to

enhance their own mental health literacy with the intent of assisting them in the identification of students who may be suffering from a mental disorder. The three-year project is funded by the Medavie Health Foundation who presented the grant to the Chair last fall. The program, if found to be successful, will lead to national implementation in post-secondary settings.

KADS STATISTICS

The Kutcher Adolescent Depression Scale (KADS) was designed and developed in 2001 by Dr. Kutcher to specifically help with the diagnosis and assessment of the severity of adolescent depression. KADS was originally conducted in various clinical settings, research projects, and secondary school students, along with further review by researchers and clinicians trained in the area of adolescent depression. Following recent research into the growth of the scale it was found that as of 2017 KADS has been validated in several languages and is being used in at least a dozen countries: Canada, Portugal, Poland, Australia, Philippines, Brazil, Croatia, India, Iran, Taiwan, China and the U.S. All versions are freely available on line at www.teenmentalhealth.org/toolbox/.

GO-TO EDUCATOR AND CURRICULUM GUIDE TRAINING BRINGS INTERNATIONAL GUESTS TO HALIFAX

The third week in July will be especially busy for the Chair team as they welcome national and international guests to Halifax to attend educator mental health literacy training. From July 17-19 Dr. Kutcher will lead the Go-To Educator and Curriculum Guide training for a select group of educators and healthcare providers. The group of invited participants will be travelling from the United Kingdom, Bangladesh, Portugal, Africa, Finland and other parts of Canada, as far as the Northwest Territories and the Yukon, to receive formal training. Once completed, they are able to bring the skills they learned back to their community and share their knowledge with coworkers. This allows a wider audience to be reached and receive the evidence-based training even if they are unable to make the trip. During their stay the international guests will be treated to a bus tour of Peggy's Cove and will hopefully get to experience some events taking place in Halifax this summer.

DR. MARTIN ALDA PART OF STUDY IDENTIFYING IMPORTANT MECHANISM IN TREATING BIPOLAR DISORDER

Dr. Martin Alda and his team have been part of an international collaborative study led by researchers at Sanford Burnham Prebys Medical Discovery Institute (SBP), with collaborators from Yokohama School of Medicine, Harvard Medical School, UC San Diego, that has identified the molecular mechanism behind lithium's effectiveness in treating bipolar disorder patients.

The study, published in Proceedings

of the National Academy of Sciences (PNAS), utilized human induced pluripotent stem cells (hiPS cells) and hiPSC-derived neurons to map lithium's response pathway, enabling the larger pathogenesis of bipolar disorder to be identified. These results are the first to explain the molecular basis of the disease, and may support the development of a diagnostic test for the disorder as well as predict the likelihood of patient

response to lithium treatment. It may also provide the basis to discover new drugs that may be effective in treating this illness moving forward.

DR. JOHN FISK COLLABORATES ON MS STUDY AND GAINS MEDIA ATTENTION

A study by **Dr. John Fisk** and his collaborators at Dalhousie and across the country has gained media attention and suggests that MS begins earlier than it has currently been possible to detect, and that there may be an opportunity to

recognize, diagnose and treat MS earlier than is now possible. Their findings also suggest that studies to identify factors that might trigger the onset of MS should be done earlier to offer new opportunities for its prevention. In addition, further

studies may identify symptoms not currently recognized as attributable to MS. The research was funded by the National Multiple Sclerosis Society, a U.S.-based charity and was published online in *Lancet Neurology* on April 20, 2017.

DR. PENNY CORKUM RECRUITING FOR STUDY

Dr. Penny Corkum and her research team at Dalhousie University have developed an online tool, titled the *ABCs of SLEEPING* tool, to assist healthcare providers in assessing and treating behavioural sleep problems among children. The purpose of this tool is to provide healthcare providers with a quick and accessible way to assess pediatric sleep problems, as well as guide treatment using evidence-based recommendations, thereby lessening the burden on healthcare providers when parents

and children report sleep concerns.

They are currently recruiting healthcare providers to participate in a usability study for the *ABCs of SLEEPING* tool. Participants will be asked to refer one to five families who report behaviourally-based sleep concerns to complete the *ABCs of SLEEPING* questionnaire online, review the feedback provided, and complete an online usability questionnaire about their experience using the tool.

Healthcare providers of any professional area are eligible to participate if they see generally healthy one-to-12-year old children as part of their regular practice, are currently practicing in Nova Scotia, and do not identify as a sleep specialist.

In Memoriam: Dr. Ben Doane

It is with great sadness I must let you know of the recent death of Dr. Benjamin Doane, whose published obituary from May 21 is below. Dr. Doane was one of my first teachers on arrival in Halifax in 1983. He was a kind and considerate senior statesman, who provided mentorship and leadership to many faculty throughout an illustrious career. His career path is recorded in the obituary, and it was an extraordinary one. His academic grounding in neuroscience combined with clinical training in medicine and psychiatry, was a potent combination. Dr. Doane was a revered teacher for postgraduate and undergraduate students, and he devoted much of his time to nurturing the skills and knowledge of those he taught.

Dr. Doane piloted the department through a very difficult period in its history. He was the first head of the department to follow in the footsteps of the founder and head for 26 years, Dr. R.O. Jones. In Dr. Patrick Flynn's history of the department, Ben described the turbulence he encountered in the years of his headship, 1975-81, with reform and redesign of the systems of care in the city. Following his headship he maintained a vigorous presence in all aspects of the department until his retirement. His contributions have been immense, and he will be fondly remembered by all those with whom he worked, and by all who benefitted from his teaching. May he rest in peace.

DOANE, Benjamin K. Dr.

Our dearly loved Ben died on May 5, 2017 at home with his wife and children beside him. Born on May 9, 1928 to Benjamin Davis and Margaret Dod (Williams) Doane in Philadelphia, Ben's family originated in Barrington, N.S., from where his great-grandfather sailed on whaling ships in the early 1800s. Ben's first trip to the area was at five years of age and continued every summer, and the family ties to Nova Scotia and Barrington in particular remain strong to this day. Following graduation from Germantown Friends School in Philadelphia, he went to Princeton University where he attained his B.A. in Psychology (1950). He attended Dalhousie University for his M.A. (1952) and received his Ph.D. from McGill University in Montreal (1955). Because of his love of Nova Scotia, he became a Canadian citizen in 1957. He studied medicine at Dalhousie where he graduated with his M.D. in 1962, becoming a Psychiatrist in 1967 and then a Neuropsychiatrist. While in medical school he was nominated for and received into the prestigious Alpha Omega Alpha Honour Medical Society. Ben served as Assistant

Dean of Medicine at Dalhousie from 1973 to 1975 and Head of the Department of Psychiatry from 1975 to 1981. During his career he co-authored many academic papers and was co-editor of "The Limbic System: Functional Organization and Clinical Disorders" in 1986, and "Psychological Concepts and Dissociative Disorders" in 1994. Ben's life was not one of purely academic endeavours. His favourite hobby was bird-watching and he loved trips to Seal Island off Southwestern Nova Scotia. He was an active member of the Nova Scotia Bird Society for many years and cared very much about the environment, serving with the Nova Scotia Resources Council. Ben was also a curler and long-time member of the Halifax Curling Club. He enjoyed carpentry, building a barn and many other projects at the old family home in Barrington. He loved playing with the family dog, Bodri, spending time at Roseway, and he and Marg gave their children a wonderful home to grow up in. Ben had a witty sense of humour, writing limericks and stories, entertaining family and friends at summer gatherings, and colleagues at annual Department of Psychiatry parties. He will always be in our hearts. He was a wonderful, gentle

and caring person who will be missed by Margaret (Clarkson) his wife of 55 years; his children, Heather (Steve Kempton), and Rod (Kim); his grandchildren, Nathan Atkinson (Jessica), Thomas Atkinson (Shelley), Katie Atkinson, and Alexandra Doane; his great-grandchildren, Liam and Halle Atkinson, and Ewan Atkinson. The family would like to express their gratitude to Drs. Maryse LaLonde, Edith Baxter and Chris Mac-Knight; pharmacists Harriet MacCallum-Kenty and John Paradis; the VON nurses, Bayshore caregivers and the numerous others who were involved with Ben's care. Your compassion for Ben and his family is truly appreciated. In keeping with Ben's interest in brain function and research, his brain has been donated to the Maritime Brain Tissue Bank and so, as he did in life, he contributes to medical science after his death. At Ben's request there was a private family burial in Hillside Cemetery, Barrington.
