# Our very own Men of the Deep (Pockets)

They are men of many talents! On Feb. 15, faculty members **Drs. This year, Robert Zed, a long-time active community leader and the President of ZedEvents, brought together both veterans and rookies of A Different Stage of Mind to make up the Men of the Deep Pockets. The choir was made up of members of many callings and professions.

# Meet a Researcher: Dr. Joanne Gusella

This issue profiles Dalhousie Psychiatry clinical psychologist and researcher Dr. Joanne Gusella. *Meet a Researcher* is a recurring article in the Research Section of Headlines. **Current research interests**: Evaluating Family Based Therapy (FBT) with children struggling with Anorexia Nervosa at the IWK Health Centre Eating Disorders Clinic. We have found that children treated at the IWK Eating Disorders Clinic after 2002, when we adopted an FBT approach, are restoring weight more efficiently than those treated before 2002, when our approach was more inpatient focused with longer hospital stays. I am also excited to participate in a newly developed CIHR supported National Outcomes Research Partnership whose aim is to strengthen the treatment of pediatric eating disorders through knowledge exchange and partnership development.

Research interests: Dr. James Prochaska's book Changing for Good (1994) resonated with me. It presented the typical stages of change that individuals navigate through and provided evidence for the spiralling that takes place on the road towards lasting change. I developed and studied one of the first self-report questionnaires for youth, examining the application of the stages of change to eating disorders. The Motivational Stages of Change for Adolescents Recovering from an Eating Disorder, MSCARED, is now being used routinely and has lead to research studies focusing on the properties of the tool, and its ability to measure treatment change. This simple measure is used clinically and in research studies at a variety of centres internationally.

What do I wish I had known: I learned from Dr. Pat McGrath, Integrated Vice President, Research and Innovation (IWK/ CDHA), that I do not have to do all the work myself, that it is a "win/win" situation when I work with doctoral or medical students. Involving students allows me to do my clinical work as a psychologist. I don't need to be the lead to make a significant contribution and granting agencies favour projects involving professionals who combine clinical knowledge and research experience. Once I partnered with other researchers across Canada, I was able to be involved in large collaborative studies: developing and evaluating a website for teachers aimed at promoting health and preventing disordered eating, developing a quality of life measure for individuals struggling with an eating disorder, and contributing to a cross Canada survey of centres treating youth with eating disorders. All of these larger projects resulted in presentations and publications.

**Most satisfying aspects:** Answering questions raised in my clinical work. For example, finding out that FBT has improved our outcomes has made our team feel more confident. It is easier to stay on track with our approach, giving parents and children consistency, at a time when an eating disorder has filled their lives with uncertainty.

**The most frustrating thing:** Waving goodbye to a research assistant who has decided to return to University to complete a graduate degree, or who has been wooed by another researcher. I'm always happy for them, but needing to train someone new is difficult to accept!

My research mentor: Dr. Darwin Muir, my doctoral thesis supervisor at Queen's University, was the first researcher who drew my focus to the importance of scientific inquiry. He taught me that a compelling research study will test the validity of a commonly held assumption. That always stuck with me and made it easier to generate research questions. He also taught me to be curious and to recognize the difference between "truth" and "assumptions."

**My second career choice:** I've always believed in the power of music and considered augmenting my training as a psychologist by adding music therapy. But instead, I decided to keep my love of singing and song-writing as a favoured hobby. I also thought of being a veterinarian, but I'm a bit squeamish. Nevertheless, my dog Haley, a top student in her class, taught me that I have future promise as a dog trainer!

# Helping to improve diagnosis and treatment of adolescent depression in Guatemala

**Drs. Stan Kutcher** and Iliana Garcia recently worked with over thirty mental health and primary care providers selected to receive training in the diagnosis and treatment of adolescent depression. The work was done through their association with the World Health Organization Collaborating Center in the Department of Psychiatry, Dalhousie University (WHO CC). In 2012, as part of the WHO CC's ongoing collaborations with the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO), the program developed by Dr. Kutcher and translated into Spanish by Dr. Garcia was adapted for use by a cadre of health and mental health experts from a number of Latin American countries. Subsequently, individual countries have moved towards implementing the program, with Guatemala being the first to create a group of program trainers with the goal of

of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada) is being used by PAHO within the framework of the global mhGAP (mental health global action program), and is being developed and distributed worldwide by the WHO with the goal of improving mental health care in primary care. Dr. Kutcher also participated in the development of the mhGAP. The training program delivered in Guatemala was the outcome of a collaboration involving the WHO CC, PAHO (Washington and Guatemala offices) and the Ministry of Health of Guatemala.

Because of this initiative, PAHO and the Guatemalan

Ministry of Health are working together with consultation from Dr. Kutcher to develop an evaluative framework that can be used to help determine the impact of the training on improving mental health care of young people. They are also interested in how training is working to decrease the prevalence to treatment gap for depression, one of the world's most disabling disorders and one that frequently begins during adolescence.

To better understand the unique challenges that an evaluation of this magnitude faces in the context of the field realities in Guatemala, Drs. Kutcher and Garcia visited a community primary care clinic located in a part of Guatemala City known for its poverty and multiple social challenges. After this visit and various discussions with local and national health and mental health providers/administrators, a unique evaluation approach was developed and an initial plan for its

application was created. PAHO and the Ministry of Health will now seek appropriate funding to apply this evaluation in the community clinic visited by the Dalhousie WHO CC team.

"It is amazing to see the dedication and hard work of health providers working in this challenging and severely under-resourced setting," Dr. Kutcher says. "With some innovative thinking and relatively minor tweaking of how the system currently operates, however, I think we will be able to help transform how care for depression is delivered to young people in Guatemala." He continues to say, "Once again this goes to show that one of the most important reasons that we seem to be stuck here at home is not because of insufficient resources (although more are needed), but because of the lack of will to innovate and use what we already have in more effective ways."

### Art and the Teenage Brain

A large, creative and powerful piece of interpretive art called *Brainshell* has been the result of a collaboration between J.L. Ilsley High School, Sun Life Financial Chair in Adolescent Mental Health and the Art Gallery of Nova Scotia.

Students of the Youth Health Centre at J.L. IIsley High School, with the artistic guidance of Ms. Melissa Marr, took on the joint art project as a way

to create awareness amongst high school students of the difficulties and challenges of mental illness and the working of the teenage brain. The Arts Express Program, a Halifax Regional School Board program that brings arts programs to schools throughout HRM, coordinated the project.

The *Brainshell* was completed in two phases over an eight-week period. Students had the opportunity to express some of their own understandings of mental health through art. It began as a

large brain shape cut from foam, which was then divided into sections and each student created their own artistic ideas. The brain sections were then brought together like a puzzle and were printed collectively.

The *Brainshell* has since inspired a large-scale art exhibit at the Art Gallery of Nova Scotia curated by Dale Sheppard, focusing on Art and the Brain and has been on display at Nocturne: Art at Night. The image has been donated to the IWK Health Centre and is now hung inside the waiting area of the Emergency Department.

# Transformational Research in Adolescent Mental Health

**Dr. Stan Kutcher,** Dr. Ian Manion (Ontario Centre of Excellence for Child and Youth Mental Health) and Ms. Vanessa Bruce (research associate at the Sun Life Financial Chair in Adolescent Mental Health) are working with the Canadian Depression Alliance on organizing a network of over 100 researchers, primary care practitioners, youth, families, teachers, educators, policy makers, national and international organizations and educational institutions to apply for the TRAM research network grant (www. tramcan.ca), funded by CIHR and the Graham Boeckh Foundation. The goal of the successful network is to transform adolescent mental health care in Canada over the next five years.

### **Emergent Learning Conference**

A Halifax based conference on teaching to meet the way children learn is coming up on April 18-19. The areas discussed will be social skills, media, bullying, gender, learning differences, mental health and criminal justice. # **Psychiatric Mental Health Nursing Program (PMHNP)**

**Ms. Sandra Hennigar** and Ms. Loretta Whitehorne are continuing the dialogue with Stanton Territorial Health Authority to determine whether we can reach an agreement about offering the PMHNP using the distance approach to the nurses on the 10-bed psychiatric inpatient unit. They have submitted a budget for approval for the program to begin in September 2013. A number of issues such as clinical supervision capacity and placements require further discussion before a formal agreement can be reached. We are hopeful that this component can be added to the existing partnership with Stanton Territoritorial Health Authority.

## Training for Staff in Tobago

Ms. Sandra Hennigar has maintained communication with our partners from Tobago. They moved to their new hospital just prior to Christmas and are eager to begin some of the training opportunities that were explored when Ms. Hennigar and Mr. Peter Croxall met with them last June. We have found a local partner to work with us in delivering a non-violent crisis intervention program, their top priority for inpatient and emergency staff. We are just awaiting final approval of their budget and hope to begin this project early-mid spring. While we are conducting this piece of work, we will also work with the Director and the Head Nurse to revise the policies to fit the training and new skill development.

# **Police Mental Health Training**

Several avenues of funding are being pursued to support the ongoing work with police training in mental health in Guyana. This work is follow-up to the tremendous support we received this summer when we presented parts of the training used in Nova Scotia to a room-full of staff from many departments including law enforcement, police academies, prison staff and staff from human services. This is a huge area of development work in Guyana, whose police force frequently acts as the "de facto" mental health providers and is usually the first and only resource called to a crisis in their communities.

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Dr. Herb Orlik, associate professor and child and adolescent psychiatrist, says the practices were actually a lot of fun. "Quite a bit of male bonding occurred," he recalls. "And we always had in mind the cause, the point of it all, the charity event to raise funds for mental health."

Lisa Mills, President and CEO of the Mental Health Foundation of Nova Scotia, says the event is one of the most engaging and welcoming events they run and is really gaining momentum.

"When it started 10 years ago it was a way to engage the community and raise awareness about mental health. It was very small."

The format has remained the same from day one, with individuals and groups committing to pledge-based fundraising.

"In the early days we had to reach out for participants," says Mills. "Now nine out of 10 people are very eager to

participate. We already have our performers organized for next vear."

Head and District Chief of the Department of Psychiatry, Dr. Nick Delva, says the event was extremely well-produced. "It showed everyone at their best. We were in good hands," he says. "We were confident when we went on stage."

Dressed in all black and donning hard-hats with headlamps, The Men of the Deep (Pockets) closed the show with Rita MacNeil's "Working Man." The group was taken by surprise when Rita MacNeil herself joined in the singing. Along with the overwhelmingly positive reaction from the audience, Drs. Kutcher, Delva and Orlik all remarked this was a highlight of the evening.

"Performing with Rita MacNeil was really something!" says Dr. Delva. "It was quite out of the ordinary."

The event was a roaring success, raising more than \$300,000 in support of those living with mental illness.

# **Seniors Mental Health**

The multi-disciplinary team of Seniors Mental Health provides assessment. consultation and time-limited treatment. This service is offered to clients over the age of 65 with new-onset mental health problems, or pre-existing mental health problems complicated by dementia or multiple medical co-morbidities. Care is provided in a variety of settings, including an inpatient unit, outpatient clinics in a hospital setting and when possible in the community or home setting. Clinicians work together with the senior and family members to identify the problem and provide treatment, education and support. Clinicians communicate with the family doctor to ensure that care can be continued after Seniors Mental Health is no longer required.

Team members are individually and collectively involved in numerous projects, many of which focus on education. The service provides geriatric psychiatry training to physicians, nurses, social workers and other learners, and provides workshops, education sessions and consultation to front line care givers across all relevant settings.

In January 2012, the Seniors Mental Health Team received recognition from the Department as an academic training program and was named Dalhousie's "Geriatric Psychiatry Program." The physicians and interdisciplinary team members are involved in training Dalhousie residents in a new core six-month geriatric psychiatry rotation, family physicians in the Health Care of the Elderly program, Geriatric Medicine residents, and fellows in Geriatric Psychiatry. In the past year, Dr. Marla Davidson completed a fellowship under supervision of Dr. Sameh Hassan, and is now working as a Geriatric Psychiatrist at the University of Saskatchewan. As the only subspecialty training program in Geriatric Psychiatry in Atlantic Canada, in the near future Dalhousie's Geriatric Psychiatry Program will need to pursue official designation by the Royal College

of Canada as a subspecialty training centre.

Members of the team are actively involved at the national level with the new training requirements and examination development in Geriatric Psychiatry, through the Canadian Academy of Geriatric Psychiatry (CAGP) and the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada.

The team also offers a CME accredited Seniors Mental Health Teleeducation Series to the other District Health Authorities through Nova Scotia's Seniors Mental Health Network (NSSMHN).

A number of clinicians from SMH team have a public health focus and offer psychoeducational groups in the community through the year. These include sessions on Memory Management, Mindfulness, CBT for Depression and Anxiety, and Healthy Aging, which addresses issues such as social and physical activity in older age.


