RASP wins international award

In May 2025, the Rapid Access and Stabilization Program (RASP) received international recognition. The program was awarded the American Psychiatric Association (APA)'s Bronze Psychiatric Services Achievement Award. This award recognizes outstanding programs that deliver services to people with mental illness or disabilities that have overcome obstacles and that can serve as models for other programs.

The Rapid Access and Stabilization Program (RASP) is an initiative of Nova Scotia Health and Dalhousie University's Department of Psychiatry.

Launched to address long-standing barriers faced by patients and primary-care providers in accessing timely psychiatric support, RASP has delivered comprehensive psychiatric assessments and digital mental health support (Text4Support) to more than 2,300 unique patients across Nova Scotia's Central Zone in just two years.

Key program impacts include:

- 1673% increase in access: In Nova Scotia's Central Zone, access to psychiatrists for patients referred by primary care providers rose by 1673% comparing the 2022/2023 (pre-RASP) and 2024/2025 (post-RASP) fiscal years.
- 25% of referrals seen by RASP: In the 2024/2025 fiscal year, one in four individuals referred — or self-referred — to the Central Zone Mental Health and Addictions Program were scheduled for an assessment with a RASP psychiatrist.
- Expanded access for complex cases: With a distinct and centralized RASP in place, 24% more patients with complex mental health needs were connected with psychiatrists through community mental health programs for ongoing care.

The APA's recognition of RASP underscores the importance and impact of this innovative model. This achievement reflects the dedication of the psychiatrists, operational leaders, and administrative staff who have worked tirelessly to expand mental health care access. We extend our sincere thanks to the Government of Nova Scotia for its vital support and funding.

Congratulations to the RASP team!

Dal Psychiatry welcomes Master of Physician Assistant Studies students

Faculty may have noticed new learners completing psychiatry rotations this winter. In February 2025, the psychiatry undergraduate education program welcomed students in the Master of Physician Assistant Studies (MPAS) program.

"It's exciting to welcome MPAS students to our clinical services." savs Dr. Lara Hazelton, director of education for Dal's Department of Psychiatry. "For most department members, this is the first time working with this group of learners. I've been impressed with how eager the psychiatrists are to understand the needs of MPAS students so they can offer them rich and meaningful learning opportunities."

The MPAS is a new program offered in Dalhousie's Faculty of Medicine. Learners complete a psychiatry block as a core rotation, just like Medicine, which has similar goals and objectives as for medical students, says Olivia Bachmann, director, MPAS program.

"Having a discrete psychiatry rotation enables PA clerks to better recognize and manage psychiatric disorders, handle crisis situations, understand medication interactions, and navigate legal and ethical considerations. It aims to improve patient communication skills and reduce stigma, leading to better overall patient care."

As part of the psychiatry undergraduate program, MPAS students learn to "conduct comprehensive psychiatric evaluations, evaluate and manage co-morbidities of psychiatric and medical illness, develop and carry out (under supervision) a biopsycho-social management plan, and develop an appreciation of where the PA role can impact the



delivery of psychiatric and mental health services in collaboration with psychiatrists," says Bachmann.

Dr. Sanjana Sridharan, section head for Acute, Consultation, and Emergency Psychiatry, has supervised two MPAS students on the Short Stay Unit for a month each.

"I see a lot of value in providing good psychiatric orientation and skills for MPAS students, no matter what specialty they choose," says Dr. Sridharan. "I could see a palpable enthusiasm and motivation from them to learn interview and deescalation skills in an acute setting. I saw the amount of time they spent with inpatients listening to them and advocating for them, and showing a sense of accountability for the patients distributed to them."

Feedback from patients was also positive. "They specifically mentioned how they enjoyed the non-judgmental style and therapeutic interactions from my two students," she says.

Physician Assistants can help bridge the gap between an increasing demand for mental health services and a shortage of primary and psychiatric providers, says Bachmann.

"By exposing our clerks to a psychiatry rotation, they will be more inclined to seek employment opportunities in that discipline after graduation."

The first cohort of MPAS students will finish clerkship in December 2025 and will be granted provisional licencing under the CPSNS following completion of clinical training.

Finalizing the master rotation schedule for 2025-26



When you look back at your residency training, what is the most important thing you learned? Stay humble, be open, and never stop learning.

Mental health as a human right: New Dal centre champions global access and education

The launch of a new academic centre at Dal signals a deepening of a shared commitment to one of the most pressing challenges of our time — global mental-health disparities.

That's how the Dalhousie Centre for Global Mental Health's inaugural director described the creation of the new academic hub at a launch event in late Mav.

"Mental health is a universal human right, yet access to effective and culturally appropriate care remains an unfulfilled promise for millions around the world," said Dr. Vincent Agyapong, who is also head of psychiatry for Dalhousie and Nova Scotia Health Central Zone.

The new academic centre, housed in Dal's Department of Psychiatry, will contribute to reducing gaps in mental health treatment worldwide through cutting-edge research, innovative care, education, and advocacy.

Leaders in government, academia, and international organizations spoke in support of the centre at the event on May 30.

A shared vision

The centre's work will align around a number of key issues, including:

- innovative and scalable mental health services and programs
- understanding mental health determinants in vulnerable populations
- promoting mental health literacy and resilience
- educational excellence and capacity building
- building strong and sustainable partnerships
- fostering global networks for research and practice

"This new centre is a powerful example of how Dalhousie is living out its mission as a global leader in health research and education," said Dr. David Anderson, dean of the Faculty of Medicine.

"As the centre establishes itself as a hub for global collaboration, including its aspirations to work with the WHO and PAHO, it stands as an example of what's possible when we combine academic excellence with a deep commitment to social responsibility and health equity," added Dr. Anderson.

Enhancing access

The centre brings together several global mental health initiatives. These include the Rapid Access and Stabilization program (RASP) which improves access to psychiatry consultations in the Halifax area. RASP began two years ago and will expand across the province.

The Honourable Brian Comer, Minister of Addictions and Mental Health, highlighted the importance of partnerships and innovative approaches to improving timely access to mental health care for Nova Scotians.

"As we know, mental health can be quite complex," he said. "There are many building blocks. We need to build up a system for everyone across the province."

He said global centres like Dal's will be invaluable, bringing together like-minded people to drive progress, challenge thinking, and "help build the blocks that we need to move forward."

Increasing knowledge and skills

The centre's other initiatives include a special-interest forum, guest lecture series, international fellowship program, and resident elective exchange program.

Dal's Masters in Global Clinical Psychiatry (pending MPHEC approval) is the centre's hallmark educational program. The one-ofa-kind, online program is designed to expand expertise in clinical psychiatry among primary-care providers globally to address gaps in specialized psychiatric care.

"By meeting learners where they are and providing education that is both accessible and practicedriven, the centre is helping to build mental health workforce capacity in regions around the world, while enhancing care in under-resourced communities here in Canada," said Dr. Graham Gagnon, Dalhousie's acting VP of research and innovation.

Establishing relationships

True to its motto "mental health equity through global partnerships," the centre sees collaborations as key to its success. Its advisory board includes members from national and international organizations. Formal agreements for education initiatives like the international fellowship program and resident exchange program are already in place.

"Today's launch is more than the inauguration of a new academic centre," said Dr. Renato Oliveira e Souza, unit chief for the Department of Mental Health and Substance Use, Pan American Health Organization. "It's a bold affirmation of our shared commitment to advancing health equity both regionally and globally."

Several research projects in the Department of Psychiatry relate to global mental health, demonstrating why the department is an ideal site

for the centre, said faculty member Dr. Linda Liebenberg, as she highlighted several researchers.

Collaborations exist with researchers in Canada, Ghana, Uganda, Zambia, Nigeria, Brazil, Australia, UK, South Africa, and several European countries.

A history of global impact

The Honourable Stanley Kutcher, a Canadian Senator and former head and faculty member in Dal's Department of Psychiatry, delivered a keynote reflecting on several global mental health initiatives during his time with Dalhousie.

Senator Kutcher, who also served as the Sun Life Financial Chair in Adolescent Mental Health at Dal, described the centre's launch as a personal and moving moment.

He said some impacts of the initiatives are still felt in global communities.

"This will be a mutually beneficial journey," said Senator Kutcher.

Her approachable presence and meaningful interaction with the students provided not only education, but inspiration demonstrating the importance of visibility, representation, and mentorship in medicine and mental health. Dr. Sulyman's participation helped create an inclusive and empowering environment, leaving a lasting impression on the next generation of future health professionals.



CAP research highlight

Dr. Sarah Fancy, Child and Adolescent Psychiatrist and Physician Co-lead for the Garron Centre, and Dr. Laura Miller, Clinical Pharmacy Specialist in Mental Health and Addictions, are collaborating on a study: "Pediatric Acute-onset Neuropsychiatric Syndrome and Pediatric Auto-immune Neuropsychiatric Syndrome Associated with Strep (PANS&PANDAS): A retrospective chart review."

Pediatric Acute-onset Neuropsychiatric Syndrome (PANS) is a syndrome involving the acute onset of neuropsychiatric and behavioural symptoms in pediatric patients. Pediatric autoimmune neuropsychiatric disorders associated with streptococcal infections (PANDAS) is a condition under the umbrella of PANS, specifically triggered by a Group A strep infection. Overlap with other neurological and psychiatric conditions, as well as a lack of evidence-based guidelines for treatment and/or diagnosis, presents challenges for clinicians in providing appropriate care.

The goal of this study is to gather data on severe PANS and PANDAS cases requiring acute inpatient care to better elucidate how child and youth in the Maritime provinces are presenting in terms of symptoms and response to treatment. Data will be collected retrospectively from charts scanned into medical

records at the IWK for patients with consideration of a PANS or PANDAS diagnosis and admitted to the Garron Centre from January 1, 2020 to December 31, 2025.

Research Ethics Board (REB) approval has been granted, and the research team has begun the screening and data abstraction process. Once all data is abstracted, basic proportional reporting of trends in symptoms and treatments will be summarized in a manuscript intended for publication. This data will be used by the PANS/PANDAS working group within the IWK to help shape treatment algorithms and future studies.



One Person One Record

The One Person One Record (OPOR) Program is working with Nova Scotia Health, IWK Health, the Department of Health and Wellness and other healthcare partners to implement a provincial clinical information system in 2025 and 2026. To support this significant transformation, a Provincial Readiness and Empowerment for Practice Adoption and Regional Excellence (PREPARE) strategy has been developed.


A pillar of the PREPARE Strategy is the establishment of Transition Teams. These groups are organized by care area and include representation from physicians, clinicians, and healthcare employees. The goal of Transition Teams is to ensure IWK Health and Nova Scotia Health future users of the OPOR-CIS receive the information they need to build confidence and comfort in the changes associated with the implementation. Transition Team members play a critical role in driving local transformation efforts, with a focus on knowledge transfer, practice integration, and strengthening best practices ahead of the OPOR-CIS implementations.

The Mental Health and Addiction (MHA) Transition Team began on March 25 and will consist of six biweekly meetings, ending in early June. On average there are 70-75 participants at each 90-minute session with excellent engagement. Feedback from participants has highlighted the comprehensiveness of the content, and resources provided. Topics have included digital documentation, transitions in care, medication management, non-clinical devices etc. and MHA specific content such as MHA's use of retail pharmacies, and how that workflow will exist in future state, the MHA provincial intake service, and considerations for a provincial

program, securing of highly sensitive information etc.

The intention is for participants to share knowledge gained through the Transition Teams with their local team and service area. We recognize that, depending on go live schedules, some participants program/zone may not be live until late 2026. The OPOR Hub (login required), which is a Sharepoint site only accessible to users on IWK Health or Nova Scotia Health networks. is an excellent resource and repository for materials. The OPOR Hub is updated each week with the recordings of the sessions, presentation content and useful materials such as one pagers and Q&A documents

Update on Intake Transformation Changes

To improve accessibility and streamline service navigation, Nova Scotia Health's Mental Health and Addictions Program (MHAP) implemented several key updates to their intake process in April.

One of the biggest changes was the introduction of an online booking system, allowing clients and families to schedule initial intake appointments at their convenience. This system will help reduce phone wait times and provide more flexibility for those seeking support.

We are also encouraging clients to use self-referral options as the primary way to access intake, ensuring they can connect with services more quickly. By directing individuals to self-refer, we can expedite the process and better

prioritize urgent cases while reducing delays caused by thirdparty referrals.

In addition to these system improvements, we are actively recruiting new team members to expand our capacity and enhance service delivery. Ongoing education and training initiatives are also in place to support staff development and ensure our team is wellequipped to meet the evolving needs of our clients.

Where Central Intake is a shared phone service and system access point with MHAP at Nova Scotia Health and the IWK, the teams have worked collaboratively to ensure service alignment. Some of the changes that Nova Scotia health is adopting are parallel to

IWK practices with the intent to standardize central intake services across the province.


Nova Scotia Health enhances primary care access to psychiatry

The program is optimizing a pathway for rapid access to psychiatry connecting patients with the care they need sooner - from diagnosis to treatment.

This rapid access pathway will roll out in stages, starting at adult community mental health and addictions clinics in the eastern zone this summer, with the northern and western zones to follow. Psychiatry consultation will continue to occur within adult community mental health clinics across the province.

It builds on the success seen with the Rapid Access Stabilization Program (RASP), which launched in the central zone two years ago.


Over the years, Dr. Pellow has consistently demonstrated an unwavering commitment to



A lyrical and thought-provoking collection of 248 brief reflections that explore memory. grief, care, and the emotional weight of history. Blending personal narrative, cultural criticism, and literary insight, Sharpe invites readers to consider how loss and inherited experience shape our everyday lives and ways of knowing. This book offers a rich entry point into discussions about how structural and intergenerational forces impact individual identity and therapeutic engagement.



Never Let Me Go by Kazuo Ishiguro

This dystopian novel, shortlisted for the Booker Prize, subtly interrogates identity, medical ethics, and the human cost of scientific progress. Its haunting and understated narrative invites reflection on the meaning of personhood and the boundaries of biomedical responsibility.
