The department's 35th Annual Research Day was held on Nov. 7, 2025 at the Atlantica Hotel Halifax. The event was again successful with 68 abstracts submitted and registration at capacity. The organizers thank all those who attended for coming out to support student research and continuing to make Research Day such a popular event.

Dr. Vincent Agyapong, Department Head, welcomed attendees, presenters, speakers, and distinguished guests. Opening remarks were provided by Kimberly Stewart, Associate Deputy Minister, Office of Addictions and Mental Health; Dr. Eileen Denovan-Wright, Associate Dean, Research, Faculty of Medicine, and by Dr. Phil Tibbo. the department's Research Director.

Our keynote speaker was Dr. Joshua Rosenblat, Associate Professor, Clinician-Investigator, Department of Psychiatry, University of Toronto. His presentation "Psychedelics for Mood Disorders: A Brave New World" opened the event. 
The day concluded with presentations of awards in three categories:




















Research Report


The panelists took questions from an engaged audience. Thank you to the panelists for sharing their time and expertise, and to all for a great interactive and lively discussion.




Sleepwell at the Atlantic Menopause Show: Bridging sleep health and menopause

At the first Atlantic Menopause Show in Halifax on October 17, 2025, the Sleepwell research and knowledge mobilization team proudly joined the tradeshow alongside a vibrant community of public members and clinicians navigating the complexities of menopause. The event was a powerful reminder of how deeply sleep health intersects with mental health and well-being in midlife women+. Attendees explored topics ranging from hormone therapy. lifestyle interventions, to workplace impacts. Dr. Andrea Murphy, Professor, Dalhousie University (Pharmacy, Psychiatry, Nursing), and Katya Kruglova, Research Coordinator for Sleepwell, provided Sleepwell resources to many of the 700 show attendees. The response to Sleepwell was overwhelming and conversations flowed freely. Women+ shared their stories, which underscored the need for integrated care.

Dr. Andrea Murphy was recently appointed to the board of the Canadian Menopause Society (https://www. canadianmenopausesociety. org/) and is eager to serve to improve knowledge and access to menopause care for women+ in midlife, and is leveraging Sleepwell resources as part of this mandate.

It offers a forum for faculty, residents and students to present their scholarly/professional working topics such as curriculum, teaching, learning, evaluation and faculty development in undergraduate, postgraduate and continuing education.

A Changing Landscape: Educational Needs of Canadian Child and Adolescent Psychiatrists

A previous Learning Needs Assessment survey completed by the Canadian Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry (CACAP) Education Committee in 2019 identified pharmacotherapy and psychotherapy as areas of need for members, and cost of travel and lack of virtual options as a barrier. As the COVID-19 pandemic brought about a greater reliance of virtual delivery of continuing medical education, a new learning needs assessment survey was conducted with members of CACAP to understand how needs have changed in the post-pandemic era.

A clear shift to virtual CME was reported because of the COVID-19 pandemic. Equal proportions of participants preferred in person and live-virtual modalities. The

topics of most interest to the group were pharmacology, therapy, neurodevelopmental disorders and substance use. The most significant clinical dilemma was access to services. Results remain consistent with the previous needs assessment from 2019.

The continuing medical education needs of Canadian Child and Adolescent Psychiatrists continue to evolve. Virtual CME now plays a very significant role in how this is delivered but is not without challenges. Despite drastic shifts to virtual CME, the topics most needed in CAP CME and challenges in the practice of Canadian Child Psychiatry remain unchanged.

Building Capacity Through Simulation: A Novel Approach to Teaching Capacity Assessment Skills to Geriatric Psychiatry and Geriatric Medicine Residents

As observed training opportunities are limited, the Geriatric Psychiatry and Geriatric Medicine programs collaborated with simulated patient educators at Dalhousie's Centre for Collaborative Clinical Learning and Research to develop an innovative high-fidelity capacity assessment simulation to teach capacity assessment skills to Geriatric Psychiatry and Geriatric Medicine residents in 2024. The program evaluation involved residents completing pre-post

surveys, and participation in a focus group and a three-month follow-up individual interview. Results showed that the simulation provided a good opportunity to practice this skill, that working with peers and preceptors helped navigate uncertainty and anxiety, and the simulation resulted in increased confidence and a change in practice. The simulation was well-received with residents requesting it to be run annually with the opportunity in their second year to complete an

Entrustable Professional Activity (EPA). The simulation could be scaled for a wider audience or serve as a model for programs where residents have limited opportunities for assessment of competencies requiring demonstration of capacity assessment skills.

Exploring Influences on the Reporting of Bias in Continuing Professional Development

Bias in continuing education can undermine learning and trust, yet little is known about factors influencing its detection and reporting. As part of a multiphase project, the team has been exploring bias in our grand rounds for the past several years, involving review of rounds evaluation data, and interviews with Continuing Professional Development (CPD) planners, within the department and from Dalhousie's CPDME office, and our faculty members who attend rounds. Through this process, initial bias terms were identified, defined and then piloted on our grand rounds evaluation form. As reporting of bias remains low, the team wanted to better understand the behaviours involved in detecting and reporting bias. To do so, the Theoretical Domains Framework (TDF), which describes 14 domains reflecting internal and external determinants of behaviour, was applied to the data analysis. Bias was understood as a subjective, often unconscious influence on individual thinking and behaviour. Four TDF domains were most

relevant: knowledge/skills (bias literacy, critical appraisal), intentions (self-monitoring, intent to be a critical consumer), environmental context (feedback opportunities, psychological safety, conflicts of interest), and emotion. Some participants described strong affective responses — especially anger — as important motivators for reporting bias. Most factors influencing the reporting of bias are modifiable. Enhancing bias literacy, creating safe learning environments, and addressing conflicts of interest may strengthen reporting practices. This work continues as we move into Phase 3, which aims to detect and mitigate bias in CPD and residency teaching. This phase is a collaboration with pediatrics program directors.

Tensions and contradictions: Understanding the forces that surround the creation of a rural psychiatry residency training site

This project involved collaboration with our postgraduate residency team, Sydney faculty members, and an evaluation specialist in the Faculty of Medicine who researches distributed medical education.

Distributed medical education (DME) has been recognized as a valuable approach to addressing physician shortages in rural areas. However, an approach to site development that focuses primarily on identifying and mitigating barriers may not capture the complexity underpinning the process. Prior to

the introduction of a month-long inpatient training experience for psychiatry residents in Cape Breton, our team carried out a focus group and key informant interviews to identify factors that could influence the implementation. A dialectical approach, which foregrounds dynamic processes and conflicting drivers, was used to analyze the data. The analysis identified five key tensions: 1) Individual needs versus systemic needs, 2) Enthusiasm versus hesitation, 3) Site integration versus site autonomy, 4) Uniqueness versus universality of experience, and 5) Permanence vs transience of rotation. The development of a new DME site involves contradictory dynamic processes that may be understood by applying a dialectical lens. Recognizing these tensions may be useful for educators as they work toward successful implementation of new DME training experiences.

Developing and Implementing an Online Psychotherapy Journal Club


The Department of Psychiatry has a strong connection between Halifax and Saint John sites, with residents from Halifax completing placements in Saint John for over 30 years. Nonetheless, opportunities for shared continuing professional development (CPD) have been limited. An online journal club would provide an opportunity for CPD in psychotherapy while also fostering collaboration and connection. To this end. Dalhousie Psychotherapy JC (PJC), was established in 2021. It is offered monthly using the Zoom platform, with presenters alternating between Saint John and Halifax.

We sought to describe the characteristics of the PJC and determine whether its sustainability was predicted by factors identified in the literature as supportive of journal club success.

Topics were analyzed thematically, with the following themes derived: 1.) 'the practice of psychotherapy',

'2.) theoretical perspectives', and 3.) 'broader social impact.' Of 13 effectiveness factors described in the literature, the program fulfilled 9, including consistent and dedicated administrative support (provided by Saint John).

PJC has been a successful collaboration, offering CPD to psychiatrists, learners and other clinicians in Halifax and Saint John. Next steps will involve further program evaluation to determine to what extent the original objectives are being met and how the program might be improved.

We successfully placed 24 MPAS students for 2026. Thank you to all the preceptors who generously supported the department in finding placements.



PLANS Co-Op Program: Psychiatry student engagement event

In October 2025, Department of Psychiatry members participated in a student engagement session as part of the PLANS (Promoting Leadership in Health for African Nova Scotians) Co-Op Program. This initiative, facilitated by Dr. Mutiat Sulyman, Department of Psychiatry's EDIA Director, was an important opportunity for African Nova Scotian high school students to connect with faculty, explore medical career pathways, and see themselves represented in the field of psychiatry.

The session was part of the PLANS Co-op Program, where Grade 11 and 12 students spend 12 weeks each fall and winter semester at Dalhousie University, exploring various health professions through hands-on experiences and mentorship. This is Cohort 11, and it marks the largest group of African Nova Scotian youth PLANS has ever had — an exciting milestone for the program and the broader health community.

Highlights from the session included:

- Welcome & Overview: Dr. Mutiat Sulyman and Dr. Laura **Downing** opened the event with introductions to the Abbie J. Lane Building, the QEII Health Sciences Centre, and the pathways that led Dr. Downing from nursing to psychiatry.
- **Understanding Psychiatry:** Dr. Ngozi Ezeanozie provided an overview of the different branches of psychiatry, while Dr. Pearl Adu-Nyako gave a thoughtful presentation on child and adolescent psychiatry. Dr. Anthony Pianosi shared insights into undergraduate and medical school pathways, and his own pathway to psychiatry.



- Keynote Presentation: Dr. Vincent Agyapong, Head of the Department of Psychiatry, delivered an inspiring talk on representation, research, and leadership in psychiatry, highlighting the department's EDIA initiatives and the importance of diversity in health leadership.

Dr. David Lovas bid farewell to the Division of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry on August 29, 2025 after close to 13 years of service. A dinner party celebrating Dr. Lovas and his contributions to clinical care and teaching was held on September 18, 2025.





Dr. David Lovas joined the Dalhousie Department of Psychiatry in the Division of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry in 2012 after completing his adult and child and adolescent psychiatry residency at Harvard Medical School where he also completed a Psychosomatic Medicine/Psychosocial Oncology fellowship.

Dave was recognized for his passion and skill as an educator and leader early in his career at Dalhousie. From 2014 to 2023, he was Program Director of the Child and Adolescent Psychiatry residency. Under his

leadership, 10 child and adolescent psychiatry residents were trained with 100% exam success, and many still practice in Nova Scotia. His influence on the program was significant, leading the first successful accreditation in 2018 and achieving permanent government funding for two resident spots annually. Nationally, Dave has been a well-respected leader and was Chair of CAP COPE committee. He led the program through CBME transformation launched in 2022 and represented the department at the national Subspecialty

Committee in establishing the CBME standards and implementation path for child and adolescent psychiatry training in Canada.

Dr. Lovas has been an exceptional clinician and mentor since joining the IWK Health Centre and Dalhousie University Department of Psychiatry in 2012. He has worked in emergency psychiatry, consult liaison psychiatry and community mental health and addictions. Dr. Lovas led the emergency department as co-lead from 2012-2024 and was instrumental in achieving our current high-quality

care and collaboration, with improved processes provincially, for emergency child and adolescent psychiatric care. His strength in teamwork and clinical excellence helped to create lasting partnerships with emergency medicine and pediatrics.

Dave also has contributed to our department and division in neuroscience education for our residents and faculty, and training and research in innovative interventions in complex and challenging to treat psychiatric presentations such as treatment

resistant depression and somatization disorders. He has been recognized by receiving the Junior Faculty Award for Best Research Presentation at the Annual Dalhousie Psychiatry Research Day 2013, and the Department of Psychiatry Teacher of the Year Award in 2015. Dave's presence in our faculty as a clinician, educator, researcher and leader has been a steady, calm, and caring spirit from which we



CAP research highlights

Drs. Chelcie Soroka and Katie Radchuck, along with Dr. Aaron Keshen, will be the local leads on a national evaluation study, "National Implementation of Highly Efficient **Evidence-Informed Treatment for** Youth with Eating Disorders." The study was developed by principal investigator Dr. Jennifer Couturier, with McMaster University as the lead site.

Guided Self-Help Family-Based Treatment (GSH-FBT) is a promising. more efficient alternative to longerterm Family-Based Treatment (FBT), the most widely used evidencebased treatment for children and adolescents with EDs, as well


as its virtual alternative (FBT-V). GSH-FBT is a virtual treatment, adapted using FBT principles, which involves a therapist "coach" and a video platform for parents who are empowered to take charge of their child's recovery. Essential material is delivered by video or written material at ten virtual 20-minute sessions over the course of 6-months, standardizing treatment and ensuring key components are delivered.

The current study seeks to evaluate the implementation of GSH-FBT within nine study sites across Canada.

This is an exciting collaboration with potential for deep impact on mental health care delivery across Canada. The following is a list provinces (and their associated study sites): Alberta (Alberta Children's Hospital); British Columbia (BC Children's Hospital); Manitoba (Health Sciences Centre Winnipeg); New Brunswick (Community Mental Health Organization); Nova Scotia (IWK Health Centre); Ontario (Children's Hospital of Eastern Ontario or CHEO); Prince Edward Island (Health PEI-Community Mental Health and Addictions); Quebec (Montreal Children's Hospital); Saskatchewan (Saskatchewan Health Authority).





Building Trust Through Transformation

The Nova Scotia Health Mental Health and Addictions Program reflects on a year of meaningful change, accessibility, and connection

It was a year of transformation at the Nova Scotia Health Mental Health and Addictions Program (MHAP), as several changes and enhancements were introduced aimed at improving accessibility to services for Nova Scotians across the province.

This work reflects a growing commitment to meet people where they are and to continue listening, learning, and evolving in how we deliver care.

Three of those enhancements, representing years of planning and work, occurred in the Central Intake service, with Recovery Support Centres (RSC) and Mental Health Day Hospitals.

"Thanks to the hard work and commitment from the entire staff, Nova Scotians can access a diverse array of mental health services without any wait, ensuring that help is always within reach," said Dana Pulsifer, senior director at the MHAP.

In April, the MHAP, in collaboration with IWK Health, implemented several key updates to their intake process, including the introduction of an online booking system, allowing clients and families to schedule initial intake appointments at their convenience.

Since launch, the changes have encouraged clients to use self-referral options as the primary way to access intake, ensuring they can connect with services more quickly. People can self-refer by contacting Intake at 1-855-922-1122 or they can book online at prebooking.nshealth.ca.

Three years after opening its first RSC in Dartmouth, the MHAP reached another milestone in 2025, with the addition of three more RSCs in Truro, Amherst, and Springhill. This brings the total number of RSCs across the province to 12, reaching a full complement of sites that were planned when the model was first conceived several years ago.

These sites offer Nova Scotians living with substance use and gambling disorders a place to seek help in an outpatient setting, with people able to simply walk in without needing a referral.

They are staffed by a multidisciplinary team of physicians, nurses, pharmacists, social workers and administrative personnel, who collaborate to learn more about the situation and support the needs of everyone who walks through the door. Each RSC reflects care that is not only clinically strong, but also grounded in compassion, openness, and partnership.

In late 2024, the fourth Mental Health Day Hospital opened in Truro, joining ones in Halifax, Sydney, and Kentville.

Day hospital staff provide structured, goal-oriented programs for individuals experiencing mental health concerns. Patients receive structured care throughout the day while returning home in the evening, thereby achieving an effective balance between comprehensive treatment and continued integration within their community.

And with a day hospital now open in each zone, usage has grown in 2025, equaling thousands of days

of intensive treatment that would have previously required inpatient admission, becoming a flexible and effective alternative for inpatient mental health care.

"Our goal over the last five years, culminating in 2025, was to develop accessible and low barrier options for people seeking care. By expanding services across more locations and leveraging virtual technologies, we are delivering support more swiftly and seamlessly than ever before," Pulsifer said.

Looking ahead, MHAP leaders recognize that transformation is not only about systems and structures, but also about trust, and building it through consistency, humility, and partnership.

By continuing to listen to the people we serve, the MHAP is laying the foundation for a new era of mental health and addictions care, one built on connection and hope.

"We have more work to do, which includes listening to those we serve, as we strive to evolve our services to meet the future needs of Nova Scotians and continue to develop low or no barrier access," Pulsifer said.

The event was presented in partnership with BIPOC Graduate Student Mentoring Academy, Black Student Advising Centre, and Graduate Student Association of the Department of Psychiatry, and was one of the recipients of the Social Policy & Advocacy Initiatives Fund.


