New exchange program boosts cross-cultural psychiatric training



In June 2024, Dalhousie Department of Psychiatry representatives Drs. Vincent Agyapong, department head; Alexandra Manning, director, International Psychiatry Residency Exchange Program; and, LeAnne Revell, fourth-year psychiatry resident, visited Ghana to meet with partners in establishing the international exchange program between the Department of Psychiatry at Dalhousie University, the Ghana Medical School, and the Ghana College of Physicians and Surgeons.

A collaboration between the Dalhousie University Department of Psychiatry and the Ghana Medical School and Ghana College of Physicians and Surgeons offers new training opportunities in cross-cultural psychiatric care. Through a Memorandum of Understanding, the institutions have established an exchange program. Dalhousie Psychiatry residents

will have the opportunity to take an elective at the Ghana Medical School, and Ghanaian psychiatrists a clinical fellowship at Dalhousie in a variety of subspecialty areas such as Child and Adolescent Psychiatry, Geriatric Psychiatry, Forensic Psychiatry, Neuropsychiatry, and Concurrent Disorders Psychiatry.

"I'm extremely proud of this partnership and the valuable

opportunities it provides to members of these institutions," says Dr. Vincent Agyapong, head of Dal's Department of Psychiatry. "Together, we are working to close psychiatric treatment gaps locally and abroad."

In June 2024, Dalhousie Department of Psychiatry representatives Drs. **Vincent Agyapong**, department head,

Alexandra Manning, director, International Psychiatry Residency Exchange Program, and LeAnne Revell, fourth-year psychiatry resident, travelled to Ghana to meet with partners as an initial step to implementing the exchange program. They visited representatives from the University of Ghana, the Ghana College of Physicians and Surgeons, and the Ghana Mental Health Authority and viewed the clinical spaces, study areas, lecture halls, and accommodation options available for visiting residents at the University of Ghana Medical School.

The University of Ghana, established in 1948, holds the distinction of being the oldest and largest university in Ghana. It is widely recognized for its commitment to academic excellence and plays a pivotal role in shaping health policies and practices in the region, thereby amplifying the impact of this collaboration.

As outlined in the Global Mental Health Report documenting the visit, the MOU represents our department's significant commitment to enhance the global competencies of our residents. The program was also covered in the local media.

"These experiences will offer opportunities to develop expertise in transcultural psychiatry — through the direct participation in provision of clinical care, in a culture that is different than the primary training sites we currently use," says Dr. Manning. "There is something about experiencing and working in a culture that is different than your own that

simply cannot be taught in a classroom."

"Additionally, with the support of departmental leadership, we have been able to embed the value of equity within the elective exchange program itself — by removing one of the main barriers related to participation in these opportunities — cost. While understandably cost does not represent all barriers to participation — I view this as a demonstration of our commitment to making this an accessible experience, and our departmental commitment to providing excellence in psychiatric care to diverse patient populations."

"I'm thrilled that it's being designed with a strong emphasis on the learner experience, ensuring that residents receive the best possible education in a safe and effective environment," says Dr. Revell. "It's particularly exciting that residents will experience this elective together, travelling and working as a team, which will foster collaboration and shared learning across all stages of training."

Drs. Manning and Revell developed their interest in transcultural psychiatry and global mental health through their past experiences.

For Dr. Manning, who studied education prior to pursuing a career in medicine, completing her senior practicum for her Bachelor in Education in a remote community in Nunavut was a transformative experience. It changed how she viewed herself, her profession, and her role within her profession. Today,

it continues to influence her and how she approaches her work.

Over the past few years, Dr.
Revell has been developing an interest in medical education, program development, and creating learning opportunities in under-resourced settings. Her involvement in the Dalhousie Special Interest Forum for Global Mental Health and Leadership Development over the past year expanded her understanding of the complexity and importance of this field, she says.

The international elective helps psychiatry residents foster a deeper understanding of diverse mental health practices, providing a well-rounded learning opportunity in providing culturally-sensitive care.

"The program focuses on broadening the understanding of mental illness across different cultural contexts and exposing learners to the unique needs of diverse populations," says Dr. Revell. "Through this training, residents will gain the knowledge and expertise needed to help reduce health disparities and promote global mental health equity."

"An essential skill of being a psychiatrist is understanding the sociocultural understandings and experiences of our patients," says Dr. Manning. "As a training program, we have a responsibility to ensure our graduates are competent to provide care to all citizens—including those that come from marginalized communities/equity-deserving groups.

As our Canadian population, including Nova Scotia, becomes more diverse, experiences

in transcultural psychiatry becomes increasingly important."

The benefits to Ghanaian psychiatrists who complete an international fellowship at the Dalhousie Department of Psychiatry also cannot be overlooked. The fellowship builds capacity that can be brought back to their practice in Ghana.

"The partnership has been exceptionally valuable, facilitating a significant exchange of knowledge and skills that benefits both institutions," says Dr. **Delali** Fiagbe, head of the Department of Psychiatry at the University of Ghana and one of the first psychiatrists from Ghana to

participate in an international fellowship at Dalhousie University under this program.

"My tenure as an international fellow has afforded me the opportunity to engage in diverse clinical environments, with particular focus on Child and Adolescent Psychiatry (Northern Zone) and Neuropsychiatry. This experience has substantially enhanced my understanding of global mental health challenges and reinforced the critical importance of culturallysensitive practices in psychiatric care. I aspire to pass down this experience to future generations who will reap the benefits of this continuous collaboration."

The department has also welcomed two other international fellows from Ghana. In September 2024, Dr. Winnifred Twum began a six-month fellowship in Geriatric Psychiatry, and Dr. Peggy Ekremet began a sixmonth fellowship in Child and Adolescent Psychiatry.

"The international exchange program between Dalhousie University and the University of Ghana offers a revealing and transformative learning experience," says Dr. Twum. "This experience is sharpening my professional expertise and igniting innovative solutions for geriatric mental health care in Ghana. I am happy to be part

"The Division of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry is pleased to welcome Dr. Peggy Ekremet for a six-month fellowship, starting September 1, 2024," says Dr. Celia Robichaud. "Dr. Ekremet brings a wealth of experience and insight from her work as a psychiatrist in Ghana, and we are as eager to learn from her as she has been to learn from us! Dr. Ekremet will be gaining a variety of experiences in our division, spending three months in various subspecialty clinics and three months in general outpatient child psychiatry. So far, we have been inspired by her adaptability and motivation, and we are gaining valuable insight into the barriers that are facing those practicing youth mental health in Western Africa, and how we might work together to innovate solutions moving forward. We are looking forward to showing Dr. Ekremet all Nova Scotia can offer and developing an ongoing educational relationship!"

"It has been great experiencing the similarities and differences in the practice of psychiatry with my wonderful team members at IWK Health Centre, so far," says Dr. Ekremet. "I look forward to

UNDERGRADUATE EDUCATION NEWS

As we wrap up the 2023/24 undergraduate academic vear. we would like to extend our sincere thanks to our faculty for their ongoing contributions to teaching and supervising our medical students. Your dedication is truly appreciated.

During the 2023/24 academic year:

- 104 core clinical clerks rotated through our Dalhousie Medicine Nova Scotia (DMNS) sites:
 - 83 completed their rotations in the Halifax Regional Municipality.
 - 10 completed their rotations at a distributed traditional block clerkship site (Amherst, Kentville, Truro, and Yarmouth).
 - 11 completed their rotations at a longitudinal integrated clerkship site (Sydney and South Shore).
- 30 core clinical clerks rotated through our Dalhousie Medicine New Brunswick (DMNB) sites:
 - 14 completed their rotations in Saint John.
 - 16 completed their rotations at a longitudinal integrated clerkship site (Fredericton, Moncton, Miramichi, and Upper River Valley).

- The department received approximately 98 elective requests; 58 of these requests were completed (50 home electives and 8 visitors).
- Annually, the department recognizes a resident for their outstanding teaching efforts, which may be didactic or clinical in nature. The winner is based solely on nominations and feedback provided by the clinical clerks throughout the year. We would like to congratulate Dr. Julie Munich, for being the 2023/24 Clerks' Choice Award winner!
 - Overall, our residents received 83 nominations from the clerks - a testament to how much the clerks value our residents. Thank you to our residents for providing such a positive experience to our medical students!
- Our Undergraduate **Education Committee** would like to thank resident representative. Dr. Kara Yeung, and the various medical student representatives for their contributions to the committee over the past year.

For the upcoming 2024/25 academic year:

- We have successfully recruited all our tutors for this year. Thank you to everyone who has signed up to tutor.
- The annual Med 2 Skilled Clinician interviewing skills unit will run in three blocks of four weeks. Sessions started on Aug. 29, 2024, and will continue on Thursday afternoons until Nov. 14, 2024. The 'Hearing' Voices' simulation has its own dedicated session on a Tuesday morning during each block.
- We will have an increase in Med 3 students (core clerk) this year, with 115 clerks in DMNS and 33 in DMNB.
- The Rapid Access and Stabilization Program (RASP) has become a clerkship rotation in HRM.
- To date, we have successfully placed 53 home electives and 7 visitor electives across various services in HRM, reflecting an increase in elective approvals.
- The Undergraduate **Education Committee** welcomed resident representative, Dr. Julia **Leblanc**, to the committee.



Resident exams

PGY-2 to 4 must complete an onservice practice STACER exam during the month of October. Supervisors will receive an email in September with forms and an outline of the assessment process. Start planning this in advance to look for assessment opportunities with your resident as it can take time to organize. Patients are eligible for an honorarium if it is not part of their regular treatment and honorariums can be requested at minimum 48 hours in advance from petra.corkum@nshealth.ca

Patient recruitment

As we begin another academic year, we ask that all staff be aware of opportunities for their patients to take part in teaching and assessment opportunities with our learners. Patients often enjoy the experience and many of our regular patients consider it an integral part of their wellness.

How is the patient involved?

- A medical student or resident will conduct a psychiatric interview, either virtually or in-person
- One or two psychiatrists will observe the interview; medical trainees may also observe
- Participation in a session typically lasts one hour

- Most sessions are held at the Abbie J. Lane Building at the QEII with potential for other teaching sites in HRM
- Participants receive \$30 per session as an appreciation for their time and many choose to participate in more than one session at a time.

CAP research highlight

Dr. Alexa Bagnell in collaboration with Drs. Amanda Newton (University of Alberta), Matthew Morrissette (University of Alberta). Mohamed Eltorki (University of Calgary) and the Translating Emergency Knowledge for Kids (TREKK) team have developed and made available a clinical resource document: "Bottom Line Recommendations: Caring for Patients with Anxiety."

The document provides healthcare professionals with key facts and recommendations on caring for children and youth who present with anxiety in the emergency department.

Aspects of care covered include the recognition, assessment, and management of a patient's anxiety, as well as additional resources which might be disseminated as supplemental support.

Understanding Stigma and Cognitive Behavioural Interpersonal Skills Program

Between 2021-2024, the Mental Health Commission of Canada (MHCC), in collaboration with the Pan American Health Organization/World Health Organization (PAHO/WHO) launched a novel program — Understanding Stigma and Cognitive Behavioural Interpersonal Skills (US_CBIS) — for English speaking healthcare professionals in Caribbean countries.

The decade-long journey began in 2013, when the Nova Scotia Department of Health and Wellness and the MHCC sponsored a successful British Columbia (BC) Adult Mental Health Practice Support Program (AMHPSP) pilot study in Nova Scotia. The program was designed by the **BC General Practice Services** Committee under the leadership of UBC psychiatrist Dr. Rivian Weinerman and her team, to reform and improve provincial primary mental health care. I

joined the academic research team as Principal Investigator in collaboration with Dr. Scott Patten, University of Calgary to evaluate the program's impact on mental-health related stigma, confidence in managing mental health disorders, and changes in client depression scores through a randomized controlled trial. Significant positive findings resulted in dissemination of the program across the Maritime provinces between 2018-19.

Then PAHO/WHO partnered with the MHCC to adopt successful programs to address stigma and improve the quality of mental health care in the Caribbean countries. Due to the heterogeneity of health systems in the Region of the Americas, differences among mental health care providers. and financial support, we set out to design a focused program with a higher likelihood of successful implementation. Two complementary evidencedbased anti-stigma programs for healthcare providers were combined and transitioned with permission into a 16-week virtual delivery model for the Region of the Americas, accessible on the PAHO Virtual Campus for Public Health, open and free for participants (blended online & tutor-guided virtual course).

The Cognitive Behavioural Interpersonal Skills (CBIS) program is a core educational component of the AMHPSP,

designed to increase providers' skills and confidence to help clients recover. The Understanding Stigma (US) is an online self-directed program available through the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health (CAMH) to help healthcare professionals recognize their own stigmatizing attitudes and behaviours, the impact, understand practical approaches to address some of the associated challenges. including videos of personal stories of lived experience. A Train-the-Trainer, and two iterations of a main course were delivered in 2021 and 2022 to 19 Caribbean countries: 259 participants. Important changes noted were significant improvements in mental-health related stigma, all measures of provider confidence and overall quality of mental health care provided, and increased client empowerment in their care. Participants also reported the program would positively change their behaviours when working with clients with mental health disorders. These findings support earlier evaluations of various versions of the program.

Most recently in 2023, sponsored by PAHO/WHO, MHCC and UNICEF, Guyana PAHO member state extended the program beyond the health sector to include *First Point of Care Professionals* such as school educators to actively contribute to mental health promotion,

prevention, build resiliency, and/or facilitate the crucial link between Persons of Lived Experience and the healthcare sector.

The Project Teams invariably work with "Local Experts" from various backgrounds and disciplines in the development, adoption, and program quality improvement process. It has become extremely valuable to facilitate communication between various stakeholders, gather authentic feedback sensitive to the local context

and culture, as well as supports projects' sustainability and accessible care, through the transfer of implementation and facilitation skills, an accomplishment I am most proud

Julie supported a Black Nova Scotian woman referred to the Dual Diagnosis Psychiatry Clinic (COAST) for visual hallucinations related to cerebral palsy. Living with her mother in Halifax, who was her primary caregiver and had significant mistrust of the healthcare system due to intergenerational trauma, the patient was acutely unwell. Julie had to navigate this mistrust while addressing the patient's urgent medical needs. The clinic's care alone was insufficient as the patient developed medication side effects that constituted a medical emergency.

Despite the mother's reluctance to hospitalize her daughter, Julie devised a plan to provide necessary emergency care while maintaining support for both mother and daughter. Julie collaborated with the Mental Health Mobile Crisis Team, arranging for an accessible cab and joining them at the patient's home. Through her established rapport, Julie gained the mother's trust, which led to an agreement to go to the emergency department.

Julie's approach, including her offer to accompany them through the ER process, was crucial in overcoming the family's mistrust. At the ER, the patient was found to have a COVID-positive bacterial infection that could have led to sepsis and potentially been fatal. She was admitted and received the lifesaving care she needed.


