Charting our new course







Dr. Lori Wozney's (PI) recently funded CIHR project "GROUND-IYS NS: Guiding Real Outcomes through United and Novel Approaches to Data" is part of a recent federal funding announcement where the Government of Canada is investing more than \$30 million over four vears to strengthen and expand the existing Integrated Youth Services Network of Networks (IYS-Net) across the country. This investment will be made through the Canadian Institute of Health Research (CIHR) and Indigenous Services Canada. and their partners including the Graham Boeckh Foundation (GBF) and Bell-GBF partnership.

Department members Drs. Jill Chorney, Linda Liebenberg, and JianLi Wang are co-investigators.

About GROUND-IY NS

GROUND-IY NS outlines a comprehensive plan to enhance data capacity and literacy within the IYS-NS network. The project



UNDERGRADUATE EDUCATION NEWS

As we wrap up the 2024/25 undergraduate academic year, we would like to extend our sincere thanks to our faculty for their ongoing contributions to teaching and supervising our medical students. Your dedication is truly appreciated.

During the 2024/25 academic year:


- **114** core clinical clerks rotated through our Dalhousie Medicine Nova Scotia (DMNS) sites:
 - 88 completed their rotations in the Halifax Regional Municipality.
 - 16 completed their rotations at a distributed traditional block clerkship site (Amherst, Kentville, Truro, and Yarmouth).
 - 10 completed their rotations at a longitudinal integrated clerkship site (Sydney and South Shore).
- 33 core clinical clerks rotated through our Dalhousie Medicine New Brunswick (DMNB) sites:
 - 16 completed their rotations in Saint John.
 - 17 completed their rotations at a longitudinal integrated clerkship site (Fredericton, Moncton, Miramichi, and Upper River Valley).
- We had 65 completed Med 4 electives (53 home electives and 12 visitors).
- We successfully placed 22 MPAS (Master of Physician Assistant Studies) students for the year 2025.

- Annually, the department recognizes a resident for their outstanding teaching efforts, which may be didactic or clinical in nature. The winner is based solely on nominations and feedback provided by the clinical clerks throughout the year. We would like to congratulate Dr. **Lousie Moodie** for being the 2024/25 Clerks' Choice Award winner!
 - Overall, our residents received 99 nominations from the clerks — a testament to how much the clerks value our residents. Thank you to our residents for providing such a positive experience to our medical students!
- Our Undergraduate Education Committee would like to thank the resident representative, Dr. **Julia Leblanc**, and the various medical student representatives for their contributions to the committee over the past year.

For the upcoming 2025/26 academic year:

- We have successfully recruited all our tutors for this year. Thank you to everyone who has signed up to tutor.
- The annual Med 2 Skilled Clinician interviewing skills unit will run in three blocks of four weeks. Sessions started on Aug. 28, 2025, and will continue on Thursday afternoons until Nov. 13, 2025. The 'Hearing Voices' simulation has its own dedicated session on a Tuesday morning during each block.

- To date, we have successfully placed 67 home electives and visitor electives across various services in HRM, reflecting an increase in elective approvals.
- We are in the process of finalizing the schedule for 24 MPAS (Master of Physician Assistant Studies) students for 2026.
- The Undergraduate Education Committee welcomed resident representative Dr. Elycia **Monaghan** to the committee.



Centre for Global Mental Health welcomes Parliamentary staff delegation from Ghana

In the spring, the director of Dalhousie's Centre for Global Mental Health, Dr. Agyapong, received a request from the Parliamentary Service of Ghana to visit the centre on a week-long study tour to gain knowledge and insight into best practices in mental health programming. Dr. Vincent Agyapong welcomed the five-member staff delegation in late July.

The delegation included members of the Psychology Unit of the Ghanaian Parliamentary Service, established in 2017 to enhance the well-being of members of Parliament, staff, and their families.

Global collaborations and mental health equity drive the mission of Dalhousie's newly launched Centre for Global Mental Health, making the study tour an opportunity not to be missed. It follows in the footsteps of the established Memorandum of Understanding between Dalhousie University and the University of Ghana Medical School and the Ghana College of Physicians and Surgeons to facilitate training opportunities for Ghanaian Psychiatrists and psychiatry residents from Dalhousie.

The eventful study tour was the result of much planning and preparation to curate a meaningful and beneficial experience for the delegation. It was facilitated by Dr. David Anderson, Dean of the Facutly of Medicine, Dr. Balakrishnan Prithiviraj, Associate Vice-President Global Relations, and Megan Chipp, Director for Global Partnerships. Members of the Department of Psychiatry operations team provided planning and logistical support.

An IYS site is a one-stop-shop with walk-in access providing a safe, inclusive place and access to a range of services supporting mental health issues, addictions, and other needs for youth 12-25 years. Sites are led by community organizations with IWK MHA as backbone organization and NS government has funded eight sites across the province (two in each zone).

ANSS is a program designed to provide historical African Nova Scotian children, youth and their families with culturally responsive mental health and addictions services. This service is embedded within the IWK MHA program.

Dalhousie Advancement Breatkthrough Breakfast Youth Mental Health

Drs. Jill Chorney, Lori Wozney, Rudolf Uher, and Sandra Meier presented at the Canadian Museum of Immigration at Pier 21 "Early Interventions for Youth Mental Health: Dalhousie Faculty of Medicine Breakthrough Breakfast" June 3, 2025.

This event highlighted Dalhousie Researcher's cutting-edge advancements in areas including digital apps co-designed with vouth to promote wellness and motivate behavioural change, youth centred approaches to care, the importance of translating research into clinical best practices, and early intervention and diagnosis. It provided insight into how this pioneering research helps improve and support systems for young people facing mental health challenges.



CAP research highlight

Dr. Sandra Meier, associate professor in the Division of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry at Dalhousie and IWK Psychologist, was interviewed on CBC Listen's "This is Nova Scotia" podcast on June 26, 2025.

Dr. Meier spoke about the work of her Dalhousie research group, the PROSIT Lab (Predicting Risks and Outcomes of Social InTeractions). and its aim of better understanding how the different ways parents use their mobile devices affect their young children, both positively and negatively.

In the interview, Dr. Meier talks about the group's "Parental

Smartphone Study," where participating parents download an in-house app which tracks cellphone usage through mobile sensing. The study also involves a series of questionnaires, surveys, as well as a visit to the IWK Health Centre and six-month follow-up survey.

"We think that depending on what apps they (parents) use, for example, when they watch YouTube videos together with their kids... is really good for mental health, and it helps for a common experience with kids. Other things, when parents use their smartphone to scroll on the internet and don't pay attention to their kid, it can be that this has a more negative effect on the child."

Dr. Meier's work is on-going, with her research group most recently having met with the Read to Me! early reading program at the IWK to inform parents directly about early screen use with toddlers. MHCC Report: Transforming health-care, social care and community landscapes to optimize the mental health of older adults in Canada

The Mental Health Commission of Canada (MHCC) released the report "Transforming health-care, social care and community landscapes to optimize the mental health of older adults in Canada."

Dr. Keri-Leigh Cassidy, director of Social Policy & Advocacy and a geriatric psychiatrist, served on the MHCC's Older Adults Advisory

Committee in 2022/23 when the report was initiated.

The report highlights the findings of a study conducted for the Mental Health Commission of Canada to take the pulse of older adults, caregivers, health-care providers, and other key partners on the mental health of older adults in Canada. It is intended

to foster change in communities across Canada, support efforts to improve mental health care and resources for older adults in clinical. educational and advocacy activities and to make our country a better place for older adults to live in.

Healing from attachment trauma: Virtual treatment shows real results

People who have lived through repeated or long-term attachment trauma often face challenges that go far beyond typical PTSD. Alongside the usual symptoms—such as flashbacks, anxiety, or avoiding reminders—many also struggle with overwhelming emotions, deep shame, and difficulties in relationships. This is known as Complex PTSD.

To help, we developed the Dynamic attachment-focused Relational Treatment (DaRT) program. Originally run in person, DaRT was adapted into a virtual format during the pandemic, making care more accessible and continuous.

How DaRT helps

The DaRT program doesn't ask people to relive every painful detail of their trauma. Instead, it focuses on what matters most:

- Looking at the present –
 exploring how past trauma
 shapes beliefs, emotions, and
 relationships today.
- Reframing the story helping people move away from seeing themselves as "damaged" toward recognizing their strengths and resilience.
- Challenging negative patterns teaching skills to shift unhelpful thinking into healthier, more balanced perspectives.
- Building coping strategies giving participants practical tools to handle distress and improve relationships.

What we found

Two recent studies looked at the DaRT virtual program:

1. What predicts struggle?

People who reported the most difficulty often struggled with negative self-worth, relationship challenges, and avoidance. These areas are critical to address in treatment.

2. What improves with treatment?

Participants reported clear improvements in depression, anxiety, emotion regulation, and beliefs about themselves and others. These gains were still present three months later.

Why it matters

These results show that even virtually, trauma treatment can be both effective and lasting. For individuals with Complex

PTSD, focusing on self-worth, relationships, and avoidance is especially important.

For clinicians and staff, the takeaway is encouraging: with the right focus, we can help patients move beyond trauma — not by reliving the past, but by reshaping how they see themselves and connect with others in the present.

Quick take for clinicians

- Key predictors of struggle: Negative selfworth, relationship difficulties, and avoidance are the strongest challenges for people with Complex PTSD.
- Effective outcomes: Virtual DaRT groups improved depression, anxiety, emotion regulation, self-beliefs, and PTSD symptoms — with gains lasting three months.
- Clinical takeaway: Focus treatment on selfconcept, relationships, and avoidance to support meaningful, lasting recovery.

Nova Scotia Health's Recovery Support Centres offer low-barrier community setting for people seeking addictions help

More than three years ago, Nova Scotia Health's Mental Health and Addictions Program (MHAP) opened its first Recovery Support Centre (RSC) in Dartmouth.

Since then, several more RSCs have been launched across the province, in places like Amherst, New Glasgow, Middleton, Yarmouth, Sydney and, most recently, Truro.

These sites offer Nova Scotians living with substance use and gambling disorders a place to seek help in an outpatient setting, with the MHAP team striving to continue to build an equitably accessible, low-barrier model based in the community.

"Care is most successful when it occurs near where a person lives and in a more welcoming, less sterile environment. Institutionbased care can be intimidating for people who find it difficult to take the first step," said Dr. David Martell, Physician Lead in Addiction Medicine at the MHAP, who also works in the Lunenburg RSC.

The sites are staffed by a multidisciplinary team of physicians, nurses, pharmacists, social workers and administrative staff, who collaborate to learn more about the situation and support needs of everyone who walks through the door.

Staff at the centres can link people to care based on their individual needs. This could include withdrawal management, opioid-use disorder treatment, community mental health and addictions programs, or other supports available within their respective communities.

It's something that has been appreciated by clients and families alike, said nurse practitioner Robert Kennedy, who works at the RSC in Truro.

"What I hear from clients and families is how thankful they are for quick and timely access to care, a collaborative and holistic approach, and responsiveness to questions and reassessments," he said.

"Clients have reported feeling safe and heard when interacting with the RSC, knowing they will not be judged or penalized for changes in their health care trajectory, but rather be included in their care to reach their goals."

Prior to launching its first centre in January 2022, the MHAP team conducted a national and international review to figure out the best way to offer treatment to people struggling with addictive disorders, learning that 80 per cent of people who needed care could safely get it in an outpatient setting.

And with half of the Nova Scotia population living in a rural environment, the next step was finding the right location for these sites which would be vital to their success.

"We wanted care to be equitable, so geography was important," Dr. Martell said." We wanted to really be intentional about trying to bring this care out to [rural] areas and not require people to drive for hours to access this kind of care."

Depending on the location, centres are available five to seven days a week, from 8 a.m. to at least 4:30 p.m. The MHAP team is working toward having all centres open for 12 hours a day; some RSCs have already achieved that level of access.

People can access RSC services in several ways, including contacting the centre closest to them directly. they can self-refer by calling the Mental Health and Addictions Intake Service at 1-855-922-1122 or book online at prebooking.nshealth.ca, or they can visit YourHealthNS.ca or download the YourHealthNS app to learn more about what's available.

People are also encouraged to simply walk in, and they will be seen almost immediately.

Observing firsthand the difference this collaborative, low-barrier and accessible approach makes in people's lives is what keeps Kennedy coming back each day.

"I find this area of work extremely rewarding, as the supports we provide can sometimes make rapid progress in someone's recovery," he said. "Clients feel they are a part of their care here and have a say in developing a recovery plan. Many have voiced how the collaborative team approach allows for multiple goals to be addressed in the same building."




Dr. Laura Downing was nominated as an exceptional psychiatrist and a dedicated and compassionate physician. Her professionalism, clinical skills, and empathy are second to none. She has a rare ability to see the whole person in front of her, not just the illness, while applying the highest standards of evidence-based care. She can untangle the most complex presentations, skillfully distinguishing between primary psychiatric disorders and organic causes of illness, and she uses the right diagnostic tools to get there. Her written work is meticulous, her follow-up is timely, and her care is always thorough.

But what truly sets Laura apart is her unwavering commitment to her patients. One moment stands out above all others: on the day she gave birth to her second child, she stayed with her patients until 8:00 PM,

making sure each one was cared for, before delivering her baby just one hour later at 9:00 PM. That single act says more about her dedication than any award citation ever could—it was not about personal recognition, but about being there for the patients who depended on her.

Laura's contributions extend beyond patient care. She is a gifted teacher, someone who inspires trainees by sharing her knowledge generously and presenting it in a way that is both structured and practical. Her residents and medical students often remark on how she challenges them to think more deeply and to approach psychiatry with both rigour and humanity.

She is deeply respected by her colleagues, trusted by her patients. and admired by her learners. Laura embodies the very essence of going the extra mile, quietly, humbly, and without expecting anything in return.



All-Resident Med Humanities Seminar Highlights Person-Centered Teaching

On August 28, 2025, the Department hosted an all-resident Medical Humanities seminar on person-centered teaching of trauma and stressor-related disorders, co-developed and co-taught by **Dr. Margaret (Leigh) Meldrum** and **Sarah Lefurgey (RCMP Cpl., ret.)**, in partnership with **Dr. Abraham Rudnick**. This quality improvement initiative, supported by the Department's **Curriculum Development Fund**, combined clinical expertise with lived experience to highlight practical strategies for centering personhood, language, and shared decision-making in everyday care.

Early feedback has been very positive and strongly supportive of the initiative. Full evaluation results are currently being analyzed—**stay tuned** for the upcoming paper detailing outcomes and next steps for advancing personcentered approaches across the residency curriculum.
