COURSE OVERVIEW

This is fundamentally a “learn to do by doing” course in which you will have the opportunity to develop and consolidate teaching and communication skills in the basics of Psychology and Neuroscience. You may acquire these skills by preparing and presenting material to your peers and first-year students, as well as critically evaluating assignments of the aforementioned groups. Class assessments are listed on p.3.

NOTE: NESC/PSYO 3011 must be taken prior to, and in conjunction with, NESC/PSYO 3012 in the same academic year and no credit can be given for one course without the other

- Effectively manage students in a classroom environment.
- Lead productive classroom-based discussions with peers and first-year students.
- Create and critique lectures, oral presentations, writing assignments, and marking schemes.
