



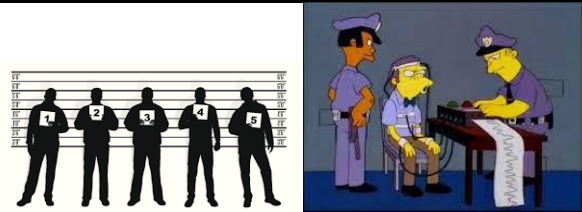

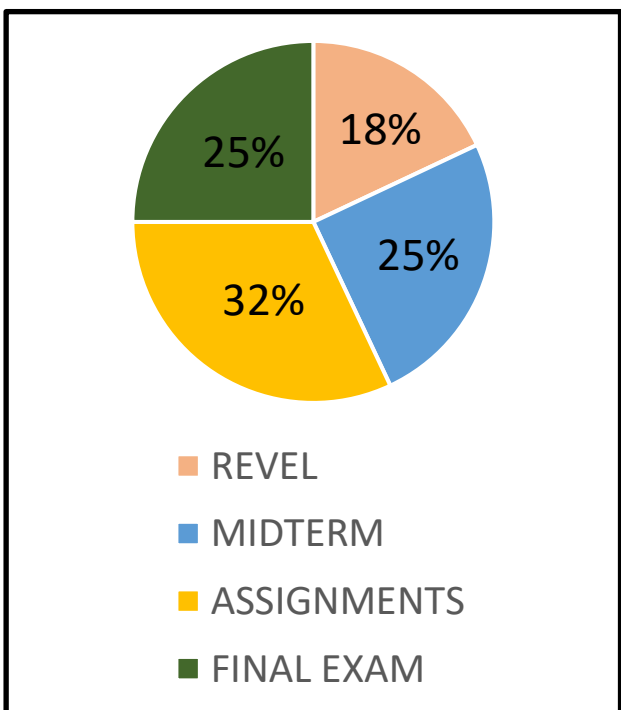

COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES

This course will offer an introduction to the various topics related to forensic psychology from police investigations to profiling and serial murder. How do police officers conduct interrogations? How accurate is eyewitness testimony? How do we measure psychopathy? Together we will explore these questions and others through the evaluation of scientific research and the examination of specific case studies.

In addition to learning about these interesting topics, my goal is to help you further develop skills that will aid you in completing your degree. These skills include effective studying for different types of exams (e.g., multiple choice, short-answer), reading and understanding empirical research, and critical thinking. Overall, I hope that this course will help you become a critical consumer of information as well as a successful University student.

I expect that this course will:

- 1) Provide you with a theoretical, empirical, and practical understanding of several topics related to forensic psychology
- 2) Develop your study skills, test taking skills, and critical thinking skills
- 3) Provide an engaging online learning environment.

COURSE CONTENT

Modules: This course is set up in modules on Brightspace. Each module corresponds with one week of the semester. The modules will contain all of the information you need for the week (minus your readings, which need to be done from the REVEL textbook). The first module contains the *orientation* information such as the course outline, instructions for all assignments, resources to help you succeed, and discussion boards where students can introduce themselves and ask questions. Proper course content begins in Module 2. Modules 2 to 12 will contain: 1) collaborate link to office hours; 2) mini-lecture videos + slides; 3) additional activities, readings, videos that may be of interest; 4) discussion board if you want to engage with your peers about the course content. Each module will have a START HERE video that outlines what the module is about and the deadlines for the week. I also use START HERE videos to give you important information on assignments and exams. **DON'T SKIP THE START HERE VIDEOS!!**

1. REVEL readings/ quizzes (18%) – Tuesdays starting Sept. 19 (before 11:59pm)

Each week you will be completing readings through our Revel text. You are required to complete readings and quizzes BEFORE the end of Tuesday each week (before 11:59pm). This will ensure that you are prepared for the week's content. The chapter that is due each week is listed in the weekly topic schedule on p. 6 and can also be found in Revel (note that there are TWO chapters due in Module 8). Assignments in Revel are ALREADY available. You can complete the readings and quizzes at any time BEFORE THE DUE DATE. Grades are based on Module Quizzes and Chapter Quizzes. **Note that Chapters 1 & 2 are due on Tuesday, Sept. 19 to coincide with the add/drop date.**

Missing a chapter deadline: LATE readings are allowed but are penalized at 50%. You are ALSO allowed to miss up to TWO Revel chapter readings of the 11 chapters that are assigned. Your final Revel grade out of 18, will be based on your top 9 of 11 chapter scores. Therefore, requests for extensions WILL NOT BE GRANTED (the accommodation is already built in). If you miss a reading that will be covered on the exams, it is your responsibility to study this material.

2. Two assignments (16% each = 32%) – DATES: Oct. 6 AND Nov. 10 (Before 11:59pm)

You are responsible for completing 2 assignments. Instructions for each assignment are located in Module 1.

Late assignments: EVERYONE automatically gets a 5-day extension on the assignments. BUT, make sure that you only use this extension if you ABSOLUTELY NEED IT. Once the 5-day extension is over, NO MORE ASSIGNMENTS will be accepted. There is no need to email me asking for an extension; you get the 5 days automatically. **NOTE:** The 5-day extension includes the 72-hours extensions offered through accommodations (you cannot stack the extensions – everyone gets the full 5 days).

3. Midterm (25%) – Oct. 20 (AVAILABLE from 8:00am to 11:59pm).

The midterm will be ONLINE and OPEN BOOK. The midterm will be available from 8:00am to 11:59pm. ONCE YOU CLICK ON THE MIDTERM, YOU'LL HAVE 2 HOURS TO COMPLETE IT. It will consist of 30-40 multiple choice and multi-select questions (4 response options are provided [a, b, c, or d]) and 3-4 short-answer questions (each graded out of 8). Questions will come from lectures and the textbook, though lecture materials will make up more of the exam questions (75/25% split). Midterm covers content from Modules 1 to 6. Both sections of the midterm are given equal weight when calculating your final midterm grade: 50% multiple choice and 50% short answer.

Missing the midterm: If you are unable to write the midterm because of illness, bereavement, or religious observance, you must inform me by email within 24 hours of missing the exam. **Failure to contact me within 24 hours results in an automatic grade of 0 on the midterm.** You must complete the **Student Declaration of Absence Form**. You will be given ONE MORE chance to complete the midterm. If you miss both the midterm and the makeup, you will get a grade of 0 on the midterm.

4. Final exam (25%) – Held during the official exam period

The final exam will be scheduled during the official exam period. It will be ONLINE and OPEN BOOK. The final exam will be available from 8:00am to 11:59pm. ONCE YOU CLICK ON THE FINAL, YOU'LL HAVE 2 HOURS TO COMPLETE IT. It will consist of 30-40 multiple choice and multi-select questions (4 response options are provided [a, b, c, or d]) and 3-4 short-answer questions (each graded out of 8). Questions will come from lectures and the textbook, though lecture materials will make up more of the exam questions (75/25% split). Final exam covers content from Modules 8 to 13. Both sections of the final exam are given equal weight when calculating your final midterm grade: 50% multiple choice and 50% short answer.

Missing the final exam: A student's request for an alternate time for a final examination will only be granted in exceptional circumstances. Such circumstances include illness or other mitigating circumstances outside the control of the student. Elective arrangements (such as travel plans) are not considered acceptable grounds for granting an alternative examination time.

5. SONA Bonus (+ 2%) – Anytime during the semester

NOTE ON FINAL GRADES: I use standard rounding rules for calculating final grades. Grades of 0.5 and above get rounded UP to the nearest whole number; grades of 0.4 and below get rounded down. Example: 77.5 = 78% and 77.4 = 77%. Given the flexibility already built into the course AND the option to earn an extra 2% on your final grades, I will not adjust final grades.
