COURSE OBJECTIVES/DESCRIPTION

This course is designed to introduce you to major contemporary theories of personality. In addition to describing each theoretical orientation, we will also critically evaluate them with reference to the relevant research literature, and discuss important conceptual issues and controversies. There will be some overlap between the material presented in the text and in the lectures. However, there will also be a lot of unique material presented only in the lectures. It is thus strongly recommended that you attend every lecture. It is also suggested that you complete the assigned readings before attending lectures.

The above course requirements and weights are final and will not be adjusted. Final marks are final and will not be adjusted to "boost" students into the next letter grade. Partial final percentage points will be rounded up when .500 or greater; partial final percentage points will be rounded down when .499 or less. To illustrate, a score of 89.499 will be rounded down and then assigned a grade of "A," whereas a score of 89.500 will be rounded up and then assigned a grade of "A+."

Requests for special consideration should be directed to the course instructor, not the teaching assistant. Exceptions may be made in extenuating circumstances provided the student presents legitimate and documented reasons for failing to complete stated course requirements.

TESTS

All tests will be multiple-choice in format. You are required to write all tests on the scheduled dates. Tests will not be returned to students; however, you can view your tests during office hours. Cheating will not be tolerated; please see the note on the avoidance of academic offences near the end of this syllabus.

A general rule of thumb for what might be on a test is this: Anything presented in lectures or in readings may be on the test. The more it was discussed in class, or the more prominent it was in the readings, the more likely it is to appear on the test.

POLICY REGARDING RESCHEDULING

Students are entitled to a rescheduling of tests for legitimate reasons. Special test times may be granted on religious, medical, or compassionate grounds with supporting documentation provided *before the test date*. However, it is the student's responsibility to inform the instructor **prior** to the test date, to arrange a timely makeup, and to provide acceptable documentation.

If you believe that you have a problem that is interfering with your work, you should contact your instructor as soon as possible. Problems may then be documented and possible arrangements to assist you can be discussed at the time of occurrence rather than on a retroactive basis. In general, retroactive requests for rescheduling of tests will not be considered.

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PREPARING FOR AND WRITING MULTIPLE-CHOICE TESTS

- Keep up with your reading. You will find it difficult to cram all the reading in the 1. week (or the night!) before the test, and will likely remember the information better if you study it repeatedly over time.
- 2. Review your lecture notes each week between classes. This will help to consolidate what you learned and will give you an opportunity to notice points or ideas that you do not fully understand. In reviewing your notes while the material is still fresh in your mind, you might also notice errors made when note-taking.
