



COURSE PREREQUISITES

PSYO 2000 or NESC 2000 (or equivalent). Students must have completed at least 30 credit hours toward their degree.

COURSE DESCRIPTION AND LEARNING OBJECTIVES

The goal of this course is to provide a critical review of the psychology of criminal conduct. This course aims to answer key questions such as: Why do people commit crime? What factors place individuals at risk for criminal offending? Does treatment work? We will focus our discussions

around 3 central components: 1) theory – what is our theoretical understanding? 2) research – what does the current research tell us? and 3) practical utility – can we put theory and research into practice? These questions will be answered through lectures, in-class discussions, through the use of videos, and polling software.

In addition to learning about criminal behaviour, my goal is to help you further develop skills that will aid you in completing your degree. These skills include reading and understanding empirical research, writing in academia, and critical thinking. Overall, I hope that this course will help you become a critical consumer of information.

I expect that this course will:

- Provide you with a theoretical, empirical, and practical understanding of several topics related to criminal behaviour
- Develop both your writing and critical thinking skills
- Provide a learning environment that encourages active and collaborative learning

This outline is an essential tool for your success in this course. I hope that you will read the information carefully and ask any questions that you may have.

REQUIRED TEXT

There is no required text for this class. Every week, students are responsible for reading assigned readings and completing a reading quiz (readings and quizzes posted on Brightspace).

For this reason, you are NOT PERMITTED to use AI in this course. I want to evaluate your ability to think on your own.

Using AI: Anyone who uses AI will be given a grade of “0” on that component of the course.

Attendance: This is an in-person, synchronous class. Regular attendance in this class is expected and necessary for success. If you miss a class, it is your responsibility to catch up on any missed material (e.g., find a classmate to share notes, do the readings and quiz, look over slides, etc.).

Modules: This course is set up in modules on Brightspace. Each module corresponds with one week of the semester. The modules will contain information needed for the week (i.e., link to required readings, reading quizzes, lecture slides, additional activities, etc.). Module 1 is the *orientation* module and contains the course outline, full reading list, a resource for careers in psychology/law, mental health resources at Dalhousie, and a discussion board where you can post any questions about the course (I’ll answer any questions posted promptly!). Module 1 also contains all of the instructions for the assignment.

**Below you will find a brief description of the course evaluations. Please note that detailed instructions and a grading rubric for the assignment will be posted on Brightspace.

1. Reading quizzes (12%) – Due Tuesdays BEFORE class (1:05pm); STARTS Jan. 16

Each week you will be completing open-book reading quizzes on Brightspace. You are required to complete readings and quizzes BEFORE Tuesday's class each week (i.e., BEFORE 1:05pm). This will ensure that you come to class prepared for the week's content. The reading list is available on Brightspace (Module 1) and links to the readings and quizzes can be found in each module on Brightspace. Each quiz will be released one week in advance. Given this flexibility, students are expected to complete the quizzes by the weekly deadlines. Quizzes will consist of 10 multiple-choice questions. **Once you click on the quiz, you will have 2 hours to complete it.** This length of time already accounts for any extra-time accommodations given that the 10 questions should only take 15-20 minutes to complete, if you've completed the readings.

Missing a quiz deadline: You are allowed to miss up to 2 quizzes. Your final quiz grade out of 12, will be based on your top 7 of 9 reading quizzes. Therefore, requests for extensions WILL NOT BE GRANTED (the accommodation is already built in).

2. Midterm (28%) – February 15 IN PERSON (1:05pm).

The midterm will be written in class, IN PERSON and will consist of 35 multiple choice/ multi-select questions and 3 short answer questions. You will have 1.5 hours to complete the midterm. The midterm will cover all lecture material and readings from Modules 1 to 5.

Petitions to defer the midterm test: If you are unable to write the midterm because of illness, bereavement, or religious observance, you must inform me by email within 24 hours of missing the exam and complete a Student Declaration of Absence form. ***Failure to contact me within 24 hours results in an automatic grade of 0 on the midterm.***

3. Assignment (25%) – DUE: Date March 21 (BEFORE 11:59pm)

There will be an assignment that is due on March 21 by 11:59pm. The assignment will be submitted online on Brightspace. The purpose of the online written assignment is to apply the course material to a real case. The assignment will consist of a case study with questions regarding risk assessment, criminogenic needs, and rehabilitation. The assignment details will be posted on Brightspace and announced in class within the first few weeks.

Late assignments: EVERYONE automatically gets a 3-day extension on the assignment. BUT, make sure that you only use this extension if you ABSOLUTELY NEED IT. Once the 3-day extension is over, late penalties will be applied (10% per day, including weekends). There is no need to email me asking for an extension; you get the 3 days automatically. **NOTE:** The 3-day extension includes the 72-hour extensions offered through accommodations (you cannot stack the extensions – everyone gets the full 3 days).

Assignment – DUE March 21 (by 11:59); LAST DAY TO SUBMIT WITHOUT PENALTY March 24 (by 11:59pm)

4. Final exam (35%) – to be scheduled during the final exam period

The final exam will be held in-person during the official final exam period. It will consist of 65 multiple-choice questions and 6 short answer questions. You will have 3 hours to complete the final exam. The final covers all lecture material and readings from modules 7 to 12.

Missing the final exam: If you miss the final exam because of illness or other circumstances beyond your control, you must contact the instructor immediately. Please note that an alternate exam date will only be granted in extraordinary circumstances.

5. SONA Bonus (+2%) – Anytime during the semester

NOTE ON FINAL GRADES: I use standard rounding rules for calculating final grades. Grades of 0.5 and above get rounded UP to the nearest whole number; grades of 0.4 and below get rounded down. Example: 77.5 = 78% and 77.4 = 77%. Given the flexibility already built into the course AND the option to earn an extra 2% on your final grades, **I will not adjust final grades.**
