#### **Course Description**

This course examines animal behaviour from an evolutionary perspective. Using the theory of natural selection as a basis, we will examine foraging, grouping patterns, territorial behaviour, parenting, mating behaviour, social organization, aggression and cooperation. There will be discussions and essay assignments.

Tutorials *	15% *	5 online small-group discussions, one about every 2 weeks Come ready to discuss a short reading or perform a simple exercise; details (including schedule) on Brightspace. 3% each, graded on attendance and engagement.	
Essay	20%	Up to 5 pages reviewing a topic you find interesting, in the style of review paper or blog post (either's fine). Detailed instructions are on Brightspace. Graded on clarity, organization, insightful content. You can just hand the whole thing in by 30 Nov, or build it in two steps: 24 Oct (topic, why chosen, outline; 5%), 30 Nov (whole essay; 15%)

Quizzes	30%	Three multiple choice, 20-minute quizzes (3 Oct, 1 Nov, 1 Dec). Accessible on Brightspace for 24 hours each, with no proctoring. Grade weight: highest 15%, middle 10%, lowest 5%	
Final exam	35%	Cumulative multiple choice, during final exam period.	

<sup>\*</sup> If Dal classes are disrupted, each tutorial scheduled for that period will be replaced with a brief (one-page) write-up of a behaviour you've encountered or an assigned reading, explaining why it interests you, and a hypothesis and prediction following from it. Full rubric will be posted on Brightspace.
