Course Description

This course is required of, and restricted to, all Biology/Marine Biology Honours programs in which Biology/Marine Biology is the primary area of study. Students conduct a research project supervised by a research scientist and attend weekly meetings of the class. The classes (BIOL/MARI 4901 and BIOL/MARI 4902) are generally taken in the students' final year.

NOTES: BIOL/MARI 4901 and BIOL/MARI 4902 must be taken in consecutive fall/winter terms, or winter/fall terms (co-op only). Grades will not be recorded for either course until both have been completed, and the final Honours Thesis has been evaluated.

Course Details

- Your thesis proposal should be submitted to the Honours Committee, by emailing it to Margi Cooper, as soon as it can be ready, particularly if you are conducting research over the summer prior to starting BIOL/MARI 4901. If you did not submit your proposal early, **the deadline for proposal submission is 9:30am on August 12th, 2024. Submission at that point should be made via the appropriate drop box on the course Brightspace site.** Please make sure to use the thesis proposal template, including the fully completed signature page.
- An interim thesis submission is **due by 11:59pm on December 4, 2024**, and will be formally evaluated by your supervisor(s). If you have more than one supervisor, each supervisor will have the opportunity to evaluate your work and the average of their assigned marks will be used. The interim thesis submission consists of any two sections of your thesis. For example, you can submit an Introduction and Methods, or submission of your Methods and Results might make more sense in the context of your project and workflow. The evaluation of your interim submission will constitute *15% of your overall mark*. Submit these sections as a PDF to the appropriate Assignment drop box on Brightspace.
- Your Final Thesis is **due by 11:59pm on April 7, 2025 (or December 4, 2024 for Co-op students that started in January 2024)**. Your thesis will be formally evaluated by your supervisor(s) and two additional readers. The *median* of the marks assigned by these readers will constitute *65% of your overall mark*. Submit your thesis as a PDF to the appropriate Assignment drop box on Brightspace.
- You will give two presentations about your on-going thesis research in class. One will be an “elevator pitch”, a 1-minute, high-level explanation of your project (*worth 1% of your overall mark*) and one will be a 12-minute, conference-style presentation (*worth 6% of your overall mark*). Presentations should be prepared with the assistance of your thesis supervisor. We encourage your supervisor(s) to attend the class the day of your conference-style presentation.
- The Biology Department runs a seminar series most Thursdays from 11:30am-12:30pm. This year, it will be a mix of in-person seminars, held in the 5th Floor Lounge, and seminars delivered via Teams or Zoom. Most seminars will be recorded and made available to the department. Seminars from recent years are available on the Dalhousie Biology Departmental Seminar channel (<https://www.youtube.com/channel/UCr54hscxQsx3M287jYFdgvw>). You will need to attend/watch 3 seminars and for each, complete a Seminar Reflection assignment in which you

will critique and/or reflect on the speaker’s communication strategies. The assignment document is available via Brightspace. **Your first reflection is due October 4, 2024. Your second reflection is due November 29, 2024. The final reflection is due March 28, 2025.** Submit your reflections to the appropriate Assignment drop box on Brightspace. Together, your three seminar reflections are *worth 3% of your overall mark.*

- Students who make their conference-style presentation in the *fall term* and perform well may be offered a **5-minute oral presentation** spot at the Cameron Conference. All other students will present a **poster** at the Cameron Conference. Your supervisor(s) should also help you prepare your abstract and presentation. Abstracts will be due by **January 13, 2025**. The 39th Annual Cameron Conference will be held on **Saturday, February 1, 2025**. It is our expectation that this year’s conference will again be held in-person.
- The Biology Department will be archiving honours theses for future access requests. You will be asked to sign a copyright form granting Dalhousie University permission to circulate, and to have copied for non-commercial purposes, your thesis upon the request of individuals or institutions. Unless you explicitly deny this permission, in writing, your thesis will be archived for these purposes.
- In addition to a grade in BIOL/MARI 4901 & 4902, a grade in BIOL/MARI 8880: Honours Qualifying Exam will appear on your transcript when all the requirements for the Honours program have been satisfied. The Biology Department grades this “exam” on a pass/fail basis. To pass, you must:
 - Satisfy the Honours program requirements (required courses and minimum cGPA).
 - Attend all classes. Attendance will be recorded, and participation noted. If a class is missed, you must contact Margi Cooper as soon as possible (or beforehand if you know you will miss a session) and submit an SDA form to the appropriate Assignment drop box on our Brightspace site. A maximum of two SDA may be used each term.
 - Participate and present at the Cameron Conference.

Course Policies on Missed or Late Academic Requirements

Extensions for submitting theses will be considered on the basis of:

- a documented medical issue
- a letter from the supervisor stating the reasons for an extension and approving the request

Thesis extensions are granted only in very extenuating circumstances, such as a health crisis or in cases where a student's experiments fail due to circumstances outside of their control and where such a failure prevents the student from completing a thesis. Each of these cases are reviewed by the Honours Committee before an extension is granted. Requests for extensions so that a student can expand a thesis into a manuscript for submission are not granted. Creating a publishable manuscript is indeed encouraged, but the thesis must be submitted at the end of the Honours course in April (or December option for Co-ops)

Requests for extensions must be submitted in writing to the Honours Committee two weeks BEFORE the thesis submission date of April 7th, 2025. Email requests to Margi Cooper (mhcooper@dal.ca).

Those receiving an extension will not be able to graduate in May, but could do so the following October. The student will receive an "INC" on their record (BIOL/MARI 4901 & 4902). When the final grade has been determined after thesis submission, the INC will be removed and the appropriate grade inserted. If students intend to graduate in May, then a thesis extension is not possible.

Theses submitted after the deadline, without a formal extension, will receive a late penalty of 15% per day.

Course Policies related to Academic Integrity

You are expected to abide by Dalhousie University's policies on academic integrity. All submitted assessments must be your own work. This means that the use of generative AI or large language models (e.g. ChatGPT) for writing your thesis is not appropriate.
