Course Description

We explore evolution in the context of the marine environment. The marine mammals form a particularly clear and interesting group for this objective, as mammals evolved on land and then the marine mammals adapted to a highly distinct marine environment. Students will learn generally of these adaptations to the marine environment, and explore particular areas of biology as their assignments. The lectures/discussions will be in three groups: introduction and background by instructor and other experts, exploration of adaptations with discussions introduced and led by the instructor, graduate students and other experts, evolution of species introduced with presentations by students.
