COURSE DESCRIPTION

Human geography examines the ways that people perceive, use, and alter the landscapes they occupy. This course considers aspects of culture that characterize different social groups, as well as the systems of production, livelihood, spatial organization, and administration that societies erect and which create, change, or destroy the landscapes within which we exist. The class introduces the principal tools of human geographers: maps, demography, and analysis of cultural patterns. This course is about the past, present, and future of how we work and live together – or how we don't and fail.

If I approve your reason for missing a Quiz, I will reweight the remaining quizzes. If Quiz01 is missed, then Quiz02 = 35% and Quiz03 = 35%. If Quiz02 is missed then Quiz01 = 30% and Quiz03 = 40% OR Quiz03 = 50%, whichever results in a higher Final Grade. If Quiz01 and Quiz02 are missed, Quiz03 will be worth 70%.
