COURSE DESCRIPTION

Human geography examines the ways that people perceive, use, and alter the landscapes they occupy. This course considers aspects of culture that characterize different social groups, as well as the systems of production, livelihood, spatial organization, and administration that societies erect and which create, change, or destroy the landscapes within which we exist. The class introduces the principal tools of human geographers: maps, demography, and analysis of cultural patterns. This course is about the past, present, and future of how we work and live together – or how we don't and fail.

- Development of geographic approaches and analyses that can be applied to political, economic, social, natural, and cultural aspects of our world.

If I approve your reason for missing a Test, I will reweight the remaining tests.

- If Test01 is missed, then Test02 = 35% and Test03 = 35%.
- If Test02 is missed then Test01 = 30% and Test03 = 40% OR Test03 = 50%, whichever results in a higher Final Grade.
- If Test01 and Test02 are missed, Test03 will be worth 70%.
- If Test03 is missed, a make-up exam must be taken in the beginning of the Winter term. This exam will be cumulative and will not be the same format as in-class tests.
