Course Description

This course examines the theory and empirics of international trade, including standard historical trade theories, more recent theories, and evidence regarding these theories. The course investigates factor movements, the welfare effects of trade policies in both industrial and developing countries, and the institutions that have developed to regulate those policies.

Course Prerequisites

Prerequisites: ECON 2200 (Minimum grade of C)

Learning Outcomes

At the end of the course, students should be able to:

- Describe the patterns of trade
- Understand and analyze causes and consequences of trade
- Comprehend the implications of various trade models through theory and empirics
- Analyze the effects of trade policies, such as tariffs, quotas, voluntary export restraints (VERs) and non-tariff barriers
- Reflect on the limitations and controversies of trade

Class Discussion:

- Every week, there will be a reading or a video posted for you to read or watch in Brightspace. You should come to class prepared to discuss the contents and relate them to the class materials.
- In class every Thursday, you work in a group of 2 to discuss and answer the discussion questions.
- This is a group work and each discussion is worth 2% of your grade. You will be graded on your written answers that you submit at the end of the class.
- Class discussion starts from May 15th.

Presentation:

- This is an individual work on your reading of Rivoli (2014).
- You can pick one topic from the topics that I will be posting in Brightspace. The topics will be assigned on a first come first serve.
- During the class presentation, you will each present different aspects of the globalization of a T-shirt. Your presentation can extend the discussion in book. Each presentation should be no more than 10 minutes and 10 slides.
- Presentation will be on **June 17th** in class.
- According to the rubric provided, I along with your peers, will be evaluating you. Details are provided in Brightspace.

Problem Set:

- There will be **5** problem sets based on problem-solving exercises. These are for you to work on and practice your understanding. They will be on the previous week's materials.
- A new problem set will be posted every Monday morning in Brightspace and they will due the following **Monday in Brightspace by 11:59 pm**.
- The due dates are May 12th, May 20th, June 2nd, June 9th, June 16th.
- You should solve them on a piece on paper and then upload them as PDFs in Brightspace.
- Please note that I will be posting the solutions of these problem sets on the following Tuesday morning.
- For calculation purposes, I will take your best four grades.

Midterm: The midterm will be on **May 29th** in class and will cover Chapters 2-6. They will have 5 problem solving exercises. It will be for one hour.



Final Exam: The final exam will be <u>cumulative</u> and compulsory and will be on **June 19th** in class. It will have 10 problem solving exercises. It will be for 2 hours.
