Course Objective: In this course, we will investigate the interactions between the environment and the economy. We will apply economic tools to analyze the causes and effects of environmental degradation of water and air in particular, and examine the different policies that have been used to improve environmental quality (with special emphasis on the U.S. in the book).

For the second part, in pairs, you will submit, on the following class period, a one-page document (typed, with both your names on the document) where you will (a) summarize in your own words the discussion we had the previous class time, and (b) discuss one of the topics raised by the video. For that discussion, you will read/learn about the topic and use the information just gathered [do make sure to include a reference list of at least three different sources]. Finally, (c) you will conclude your discussion by articulating your thoughts on the topic.

Final Exam (50%)

- A 1 hour comprehensive exam will take place on the last day of classes, June 18 (W)
- The exam will be held in person.
- The exam will be based on everything covered during the term (lecture notes and readings or videos).
- It will include 30 multiple choice questions.
