**Course Delivery:** This course will be delivered in-person, supplemented sources posted on Brightspace if needed.

**Description:** The purpose of this course is to provide the student with an understanding of the basic economic concepts underlying microeconomic analysis. In this course, we will explore the foundations of microeconomic theory, focusing on the behavior of individuals and firms, and the interaction of these agents in the market. We will also examine the consumer choice, labor and capital markets.

Course Prerequisites: ECON 1101.03 with a minimum grade of C.

**Learning Outcomes:** By the end of the course, students should be able to:

- Understand consumer behavior.
- Solve a consumer's utility maximization problem mathematically and graphically.
- Understand firm behavior.
- Solve a firm's cost minimization and profit maximization problems mathematically and graphically.
- Analyze different types of market structures.
- Explain the welfare effect of the different economic agent under different market structures.
- Apply economic principles to a range of real-life problems and policy questions.

Please solve the tutorial questions for practice and bring materials you have questions about to the tutorials. I feel that it is important that you be able to articulate your understanding of the concepts presented in class by explaining them and solving problems in tutorials. Although I have not allocated a portion of the grade in class or tutorial participation, I will expect that students come to class, and tutorials prepared to discuss the assignments and problem sets for that week.
