**Course Description:**

This is a graduate course in labour economics. The course focuses on covering contemporary topics in labour economics, such as education, health and family economics. The course also aims to acquaint students with various empirical methodologies used in labour economics.

**Prerequisites:**

Students must have a good understanding of undergraduate level econometrics before taking this course. Being able to use a statistical software such as STATA would also be a valuable asset in succeeding the course.

**Course Assessment:** Students will be evaluated on the basis of three course requirements:

- In-person exam (30%): March 21, 16:05-17:05
- Replication and Presentation (30%): Each student will replicate an academic paper. The paper must be published in one of the following journals: AER, AEJ Applied, AEJ Policy, or JOLE. The student must obtain the data and use STATA to replicate the paper. The student will also present the paper to the class, as if he/she were the author presenting the paper at a conference.
- Term paper (40%): Proposal due on March 2. Final paper due on April 14.
