Course Description and Objectives

ECON 2326 Money and Banking

CREDIT HOURS: 3

The course concerns the nature and operation of the financial system with particular reference to the Canadian experience. It investigates financial instruments (including money) and institutions and the social control of the supply of money and credit.

Learning Objectives

This class introduces the fundamental concepts of money and banking and helps to develop the analytical skills of students. It provides an understanding of basic tools and principles of money and banking, financial institutions, and monetary policy in considerable depth within the framework of an undergraduate level class. It also is concerned with the use and application of money and banking, monetary policy and the relevance of this theory in the Canadian context as well as in an international context. This course provides an excellent understanding of cross-country comparison of the core concepts of money and banking in a macroeconomic context.

Course Assessment

Evaluation for the course will involve four components: weekly quizzes, a mid-term exam, a final exam and a research paper. The weights of each component are indicated.

Since extenuating circumstances may occasionally prevent students from completing all quizzes on time, the score on the lowest quiz will be excluded from the average calculation.

Research Paper 15% - DUE JUNE 11th The topic will be: **HOW APPROPRIATE HAS BEEN THE CANADIAN MONETARY POLICY REPONSE TO INFLATIONARY PRESSURES IN RECENT YEARS** (at least 2000 words). Students may elect to join with up to 2 other students to prepare a jointly-authored paper.
