Course Description : *Groups, subgroups, permutation groups, cosets, direct products, fundamental theorem of finitely generated abelian groups, simple groups, group homomorphisms, factor groups, isomorphism theorems of groups, series of groups, Sylow theorems and applications. Additional topics may include free groups, group actions, and groups in Topology or Homology.*

Course Prerequisites: Math 2040 or Math 2135

Required Course Material: "<u>A First Course in Abstract Algebra</u>" by Fraleigh (seventh edition) is the main text book. "Algebra" by Michael Artin and "Abstract Algebra", by Dummit & Foote are both excellent companion books and will occasionally be used as supplements. These are not required for the course, but make good extra (and more advanced) reading.

Course Content: We will be covering chapters 1, 2, 3, 7 of the text supplemented with some extra topics, and possibly also Chapter 8.

You may work in groups on problems, but the written work that is handed to me should be written by each student individually. In particular, I do not accept work that is too similar to another person's.

It is the responsibility of each student to be present in class and take note of assignments. Practice problems may be assigned during some classes. Students are expected to think about these problems and participate in discussions about them. A missed exam counts as zero unless a doctor's note is presented or prior arrangements have been made with me. Calculators, textbooks, and notes are not allowed in exams unless specifically noted otherwise.
