MATH 5035/4035: Topics in Commutative Algebra Winter 2024

Course Description: The course will be built around developing the language to understand and tools to potentially solve a problem a combinatorial commutative algebra.

Topics will include (and will be adjusted throughout the semester as needed): Basics of commutative algebra; monomial ideals in polynomial rings; free resolutions; resolutions of monomial ideals using combinatorial topology; simplicial complexes, cell complexes, polyhedral complexes; discrete Morse theory, and more as needed.

Course Prerequisites: *Dalhousie MATH 4045 (Module Theory)*

Required Course Material: *I will be using different sources, no textbook required.*

Course Assessment: The structure of the course is so that we all write a paper, jointly, about the main problem in the course. Students will be expected to contribute sections to this manuscript, carry out computations, and give presentations on specific topics or research papers. We will aim to write a concise, coherent and beautiful manuscript that can be potentially submitted for publication.

Students are expected to be in class in order to pass this course. If you will be absent, please discuss with me in advance.

Graduate Students: there is no homework or exam.

Undergraduate students: will receive homework (worth 25% of the final grade) and a midterm (worth 25% of the final grade). The last 50% will be a written project.

Course Policies: Homework will be assigned at the end of each topic. All or some problems on each assignment will be graded. Homework is to be handed in at the beginning of class, and is expected to be original work from the student. All sources used for solving homework problems must be properly cited. Copying (complete or outlines of) solutions from any source is not acceptable. Late homework counts as zero, but at the end of the term the two lowest homework grades for each student will be dropped. A missed exam counts as zero unless a doctor's note is presented or prior arrangements have been made with me. Calculators, textbooks, online searches and notes are not allowed in exams.
