The **CERTIFICATE IN INDIGENOUS STUDIES** offers Dalhousie students and community members a chance to enrich their understanding of the L'nuk (also called the Mi'kmaw) and other Indigenous peoples across Turtle Island (North America).

The Certificate offers a focus on social and environmental factors that shape health, centering Indigenous perspectives on wellbeing and the nature of illness. You will gain a solid grounding in historical and contemporary issues affecting the lives of Indigenous people, and an understanding of strategies used to promote wellness, provide culturally appropriate health services, and conduct respectful and community-based health research. Courses are taught by Indigenous scholars and knowledge holders.

Student learning at Dalhousie is supported by the Elders in Residence and Traditional Knowledge Keepers Program.

A Certificate in Indigenous Studies can help to prepare you for work in Indigenous governance, land claim negotiations, politics, research, teaching, resource development, and more.
