AT A GLANCE:

The school began as the School of Human Communication Disorders (SHCD) and was founded in 1976. It offers the only programs in audiology and speech-language pathology in Atlantic Canada. Students receive valuable clinical experience.

The School is strongly affiliated with Hearing and Speech Nova Scotia, a provincial agency whose mandate is to provide speech, language and hearing services to Nova Scotians.

PROGRAMS:

Speech-Language Pathology (MSc)

The speech-language pathology program at Dalhousie University involves three years of full-time study allotted to course work, clinical practice, and a research project or thesis. The program leads to a Master of Science (MSc) degree.

Audiology (MSc)

The audiology program at Dalhousie University involves three years of full-time study allotted to course work, clinical practice, and a research project or thesis. The program leads to a Master of Science (MSc) degree.

Health (PhD)

The PhD in Health is offered as a full-time residency program. Students who have completed a thesis-based Masters are eligible for two-year residency during which the student must reside in Halifax. Students with a non-thesis based or entry-to-practice Masters are eligible for three-year residency.

FAST FACTS:

- Our mission is to educate audiologists and speech language pathologists, advance knowledge in communication sciences and disorders, promote diversity in our professions, and advocate for people with communication disorders.
- We deliberately have no prerequisite courses in order to attract the highest quality of applicants possible. Our students have a wide-range of academic backgrounds and life experiences.
- We offer extensive clinical education opportunities, including two 12-week placements, one in the middle and one at the end of the program.
- Many of these experiences occur at the multiple sites of Hearing and Speech Nova Scotia and within School Clinics.
- Our professors are strongly committed to providing students with outstanding learning opportunities.
 Students also benefit from the involvement of local speech-language pathologists and audiologists in course instruction.
- Research is an important part of study at the graduate level. We offer project and thesis options for research experience.
- We have a variety of clinics such as the in-house Audiology Clinics, the Speech and Language Clinics, the Dalhousie Hearing Aid Assistance Program, and the School-age community clinic.
