The Faculty of Health is now accepting applications for teaching assistants for the IPHE course "Introduction to Cultural Safety in Healthcare for Indigenous Peoples" during the winter term of 2025.

WORK ASSIGNMENT: The duties of the Teaching Assistant include reviewing and understanding the course content and TA expectations prior to the course start and completing a facilitator training session with the course instructor. The main role of the TA for this course is facilitation of student understanding of the module content and includes assisting the instructor in the presentation and delivery of a course, directly interacting and evaluating students via discussion boards and synchronously in online tutorials. Weekly attention to student needs and submission of documents is required. The course is offered as a mix of asynchronous/synchronous sessions delivered online via Brightspace and Zoom with document submission in Microsoft Teams. Teaching Assistants must have access to a computer with working internet to run online meetings and instruction (no tablet/iPad/phone).

WINTER TERM 2025 (January 6 – April 5, 2025)

Course title: IPHE: Introduction to Cultural Safety in Healthcare for Indigenous People

Anticipated number of hours: 45 TA hour

REQUIREMENTS OF POSITION: An undergraduate degree or a degree in a health-related discipline is normally required for all undergraduate courses however some people have unique life experiences or knowledge that make them eligible for this course. As this is a course dedicated to the understanding of Indigenous health, history, anti-Indigenous racism and trauma-informed care practices from a community perspective, preference will be given to individuals that identify as Indigenous and have knowledge and experience in this area. The ability to guide challenging conversations, encourage reflective thought and navigate group engagement/discussion is required. TAs will need to engage and evaluate engagement of learners, providing regular feedback online to the instructor. This course is interprofessional in nature and student groups are made up of members from the schools of Nursing, Medicine, Pharmacy, Physicians Assistants, Dentistry and Dental Hygiene.

Applicants should submit a letter of interest and their CV to katiegloade@dal.ca, Assistant Professor, Dalhousie University, School of Nursing. Teaching Assistants will report to the instructor of record for their course and work under the protection of CUPE Collective Agreement 3912 – Dalhousie University.
