COURSE DESCRIPTION

This is an introductory survey of the basic procedural and substantive elements of the law as it affects families. It covers the basic principles of constitutional jurisdiction over the family and family courts, followed by a series of family law topics, in the order that they are typically resolved between spouses, partners, or parents. These include: marriage and domestic partnerships; separation; divorce; parenting; adoption; family violence; division of property; child support, and; spousal support.

REQUIRED MATERIALS

Family Law Casebook (Thompson & Chewter) and a *Statutory Supplement* 2018-2019, posted to Brightspace, plus occasional articles and cases posted on Brightspace. I will advise you when I post additional materials.

PEDAGOGICAL APPROACH

The course will consist of a blend of lectures, in-class discussions, and problem-based learning exercises. The approach to classroom interaction is based on the assumption that students have done the readings assigned for the day.

We will do four problems, which will be posted on Brightspace, at the beginning of our coverage of the relevant topic. (For example, the problem on Relocation will be posted prior to Class 5, when we sill start looking at Parenting/Custody; the problem on Division of Property, prior to class 9.)

CLASSROOM ENVIRONMENT

We will discuss some challenging subjects. Accordingly, the course is premised on the understanding that we all come to class with a variety of experiences and various levels of familiarity with the different subjects covered. As such, please keep in mind the following principles (borrowed and adapted from Professor Tracey Lindberg at the University of Ottawa):

- 1. We have the right to make kind mistakes. We will make mistakes and it is our responsibility to be as informed as possible when we get to class in order that our mistake is kind.
- 2. It actually does hurt us, as humans, to hear stereotypes, generalizations and negative understandings about one's race, gender or subject position. While we can all make kind mistakes, let us also be fully informed and gentle as we are talking about other people in the room.
- 3. You have the right to ask any question. While you are encouraged to speak freely, if you are shy or uncomfortable, please write it down and I will answer it during / as part of a lecture.
- 4. The goal of these principles is to acknowledge that we have continuing relationships with each other. These relationships must be respectful and reciprocal in order for us to share space and ideas (inside the classroom and out).

EVALUATION

Final exam worth 100%.

The exam is closed-book, with the exception of the Statutory Supplement, which may be highlighted and/or underlined and tabbed, with each tab containing no more than five words, and referring only to other parts of the Statutory Supplement. No marginal annotations or notes are permitted.

The exam will take place on Monday, December 10, 2018.

COMMUNICATION

I will communicate with the class via BrightSpace 'Announcements' and email to students' Dalhousie accounts. Students are deemed to have received all email sent to their official university addresses.

As stated above, substantive questions are best answered in person, and not by email. I am happy to answer questions after class, during my office hours, or at a mutually convenient time if you cannot make it to my office hours.
