DR. PAMELA D. PALMATER is a Mi'kmaw lawyer, professor, author and social justice activist from Ugg'i'ganjig (Eel River Bar First Nation). She currently holds the position of Full Professor and Chair in Indigenous Governance at Toronto Metropolitan University. One of the public educators for the **Idle No More** movement, Pam advocates alongside other movements focusing on social justice and human rights. She is frequently called as a legal expert before Parliamentary, Senate and United Nations committees dealing with laws and policies impacting Indigenous Peoples, and is considered one of Canada's Top 25 Influential Movers and Shakers by the *Financial Post*.

Join us on **Friday, September 30 at 10 am (AST)** to learn from DFA member Dr. Debbie Martin. To help us recognize National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, Debbie will speak **via zoom** on "[Reconcili-ACTION in research: Is the academy headed in the right direction?](#)", bringing her unique perspective to the topic. A professor of Health Promotion at Dalhousie, Debbie is also a Tier II Canada Research Chair in Indigenous Peoples' Health and Well-Being. She leads two large multi-year network grants: the Wabanaki-Labrador Indigenous Health Research Network, and the Atlantic Indigenous Mentorship Network. Both networks offer funding, mentorship and research supports to Indigenous peoples and communities within the Atlantic region. Debbie is also Chair of the Institute of Indigenous Peoples' Health Advisory Board at the Canadian Institutes for Health Research and is a newly-elected member of the Royal Society of Canada College of New Scholars. She is Inuk and a member of NunatuKavut, and also mom to two amazing but noisy kids, 10-year-old Marty and Anna-Rose, age 6.
