

**International Schulich Law Visiting Scholar Program:  
Call for Expressions of Interest  
Schulich School of Law, Dalhousie University  
Halifax, Nova Scotia, Canada**

The successful International Schulich Law Visiting Scholar will spend a minimum of 4 weeks and a maximum of one term in residence at the Schulich School of Law, Dalhousie University. To facilitate active participation in the life of the law school, the Schulich Scholar must be in residence during the academic year, either between September and November 2020 or January to March 2021. The goal of the International Schulich Law Visiting Scholar program is to support and expand international research collaborations and academic exchange, with a focus on early to mid-career scholars who hold academic appointments in the Global South.

As part of their visit, the Schulich Scholar will be expected to conduct independent research, contribute a presentation to the faculty seminar series, hold sessions with the graduate students, and explore new research directions among Schulich Law faculty members and international partners. Depending on interest and expertise, the Visiting Schulich Scholar may also be invited to teach a seminar or intensive course at the law school.

Successful candidates will demonstrate evidence of and a commitment to research. Applicants will be asked to submit a Curriculum Vitae (CV), statement of proposed research (approximately 1000 words), along with a cover letter outlining their objectives for the visit that identifies potential linkages to current Schulich Law research initiatives or faculty. They may, but are not required to, make contact with individual faculty in advance.

The successful candidate or candidates will receive an honorarium of between \$10,000 CAD and \$20,000 CAD, depending on the length of their stay and contributions to teaching, and will be responsible for their own travel, accommodation and living expenses. Visiting scholars will have shared access to office space, library privileges, and will have a faculty host for the visit.
