

Dalhousie University – Probationary Tenure-Track position Canadian Politics

The Political Science Department at Dalhousie University invites applications for a probationary tenure-track position in Canadian Politics at the level of Assistant Professor, with a focus on government institutions and political processes, and how these are affected by one or more of constitutional politics, judicial politics, Indigenous politics, or disruptive digital technologies. The successful candidate will be expected to teach and supervise at the graduate and undergraduate levels in Canadian politics. Candidates must have a PhD in hand or be very near completion and a promising research profile and agenda; and demonstrated potential for teaching excellence. They will be expected to contribute to both undergraduate and graduate teaching and supervision (at BA, MA, and PhD levels). This position is subject to budgetary approval.

Established in 1818, Dalhousie is a leading research-intensive university offering more than 180 degree programs in 11 faculties. It is the largest university in Atlantic Canada and is located in the heart of Halifax, a scenic coastal city and capital of Nova Scotia, which is home to 13 Mi'kmaq First Nations, a deeply rooted African Canadian community, and an increasingly diverse population. The Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences is a dynamic body of students, faculty, and staff arranged in more than twenty programs and departments, many offering graduate degrees.
