The students must have completed at least two years of postsecondary study and be enrolled in an undergraduate degree program. The funding is provided for a one-year period: September to August (2018-2019).

Eligibility Requirements

- First Nations, Métis, and Inuit undergraduates who are undertaking or are interested in undertaking Indigenous community-based health and wellness research.
- Undergraduates must be undertaking research with the supervision of an Indigenous or allied health scholar at a post-secondary institution in Atlantic Canada to which funds can be transferred.

Successful applicants will participate in and contribute to the Atlantic Indigenous Mentorship Network and broader Indigenous Mentorship Network Program activities.

The funding is provided for a one-year period: September to August (2018-2019).

Eligibility Requirements

- First Nations, Métis, and Inuit Postdoctoral Fellows and early career researchers who are undertaking Indigenous community-based health and wellness research.
- Postdoctoral Fellows must be undertaking research with the supervision of an Indigenous or allied health researcher at an academic or community institution or organization in Atlantic Canada where funds can be transferred.
- Early career researchers must be [within the first 60 months of a faculty appointment](#) to a post-secondary institution in Atlantic Canada where funds can be transferred.
