The CEO reporting to a joint labour management Board of Directors is responsible for the management of the 325-person organization providing workplace accident insurance to 35,000 claimants annually. The WCB has an annual budget of \$210 million and \$1 billion in long-term liabilities.

During David's 11-year tenure at the WCB, the agency's legislation was changed to initiate an earnings loss method of paying benefits, restructured its business processes establishing an e-commerce mechanism for revenue collection in partnership with Revenue Canada and established publicly reported corporate service performance measures. The latter two developments resulted in the agency winning national & international awards.

The Director is responsible for all aspects of staffing, final product quality and managing the workflow of a variety of contracts running simultaneously. During this time David continued to teach in the Master of Public Administration Program.

In addition to teaching part-time in the Master of Public Administration program at Dalhousie University, David undertook a series of research contracts ranging in size from \$5,000 to \$500,000. The largest was the operation of the Nova Scotia Task Force on AIDS. This contract required strong diplomatic and interpersonal skills due to the controversial nature of the subject and breadth of stakeholder representation on the 23-person Task Force.
